NEW REGIONAL USITT SECTIONS

The Board of Directors and the Executive Committee approved a request for a Northern California Section at their October meeting. They also passed unanimously a motion to "endorse and encourage the concept of the establishment of a New York Section." A petition is being circulated to obtain the needed signatures to establish the section before January.

The Northern California group was chartered with 39 members, with Charles E. Williams of San Francisco State College as chairman.

The creation of two new regional sections is only a small part of USITT's total activity. George Gill is working in Florida to establish a section, and two meetings have been held so far. In North Carolina, Mark Sumner is doing the same, and William Herring is following suit in Georgia.

In Dallas, John Rothgeb is not limiting his activities simply to planning the best annual conference in the Institute's history, but he is also in the process of forming a Texas Section. We find in New England that a group called NEITT is presently conducting a comprehensive service and workshop program, but a USITT Section will soon be set up there to coordinate their work with ours. We have also received word from several schools that they are now contemplating student chapters.

At the present time, the Midwest Section has three states in its charter, but has member attendance from at least

HEADS UCLA PROGRAM

Hy Faine, national executive secretary of the American Guild of Musical Artists (AFL-CIO) since 1946, has been named Professor of Arts Administration at the Graduate School of Business Administration, University of California Los Angeles, effective December 1st. It is the first time anyone has held that title there.

Professor Faine, a graduate of the Harvard Law School, has been associated with the American Federation of Radio Artists, the War Labor Board, and the U.S. State Department Cultural Exchange Program. He was a labor relations consultant to the Ministry of Labor in Israel in 1955-56.

The Arts Administration Program at UCLA was begun in 1969. Now in its second year, it will offer a master's degree in the specialized field of cultural administration. Its purpose is to train administrators for non-profit groups, such as museums, theatres, dance companies, orchestras, opera groups, as well as arts councils and other bodies supporting cultural enterprises.

The Presentation Committee stimulates research in an attempt to explore the creative and interpretive elements of theatre art, and to communicate the results of this research to the theatre community at large.

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA

The Northern California Section held three meetings this fall. The first two were devoted to organization and to meeting the application requirements for the establishment of a new USITT section.

The initial meeting, which took place on October 7th, was attended by about 45 people. USITT Executive Director Tom DeGaetani addressed the meeting, and spoke on USITT's future plans and national activities.

The second meeting, which took place on October 21st, marked the signing of the USITT Section application by 40 dues-paying Institute members. Ten days later, the Board of Directors accepted the application.

The last fall meeting was held on December 2nd, for the purpose of informing the members of the Board's action.

As yet, the Section's future activities are still in the planning stage. We hope to hold monthly meetings, in and around the San Francisco Bay area. The Section has agreed to participate with the Southern California Section in the annual meeting of the California Educational Theatre Association, which will take place on April 2, 3, and 4 in Sacramento. We have not yet decided on the degree or extent of the participation.

The Section has set up four committees, paralleling the national organization. They cover architecture. engineering, presentation, and administration. Three have already begun their activities, and the fourth plans to do so very soon.

MIDWEST

USITT's Midwest Section began its third season with a talk and slide show by Goodman Theatre designer James Maronek, who discussed unconventional approaches to scenic design. Illustrating with slides of sketches, models and actual productions, he suggested several gambits for freeing the designer's mind, such as selcting and breaking a rule ("Don't use white on stage"). He proposed that the designer consider how his play might be done as a ballet, or how a period piece might be done in a modern setting. Turn your budget limitations into assets by using them (if lumber is too expensive, try hanging unframed muslin panels).

The talk was attended by 90 people. Questions and discussion followed. A drive for new memberships has resulted in applications for 58 regular, 13 student, and two organizational members.

The Sections second fall meeting took place in October at the Art Drapery Studios, Inc. of Chicago. Dr. Bernhard Works presented a slide lecture prepared by John Morris, former safety coordinator of the University of Illinois, who is a member of the code committee of the National Fire Protection Association. His lecture was a carefully researched analysis of the Iroquois Theatre fire, and described the damage and the safety discrepancies and errors that contributed to that disaster. Slides showed the physical make-up of the theatre, its exit problems, and the source and nature of the fire.

After the lecture, there was a panel discussion on the subject of theatre fire safety. Panelists were Dr. Walter Dewey, theatre consultant; Paul Tyler, lighting consultant, and Max Roller of the Channon Corporation. They outlined the need for proper housekeeping duties in stage and backstage shop areas, and safe requirements in building structure and stage equipment.

There were 78 members in attendance, and the meeting ended with a tour of Art Drapery Studios and the J.H. Channon Corp.

services and research

We are pleased to announce that on September 30th, 1970, USITT was officially designated Service Affiliate to the Arts and Humanities Division of the National Office of Education (O of E) in the areas of performing arts-architecture, -engineering and -administration. Under the present terms of the arrangement, USITT will be the early recipient of basic information on O of E funding programs in support of the arts. An early issue of the NEWSLETTER will find this page devoted to detailed information on such federal programs.

- +"A Prototypical Design Solution for Conversion of Gymnasia to Performing Arts Usage," a collaborative effort of USITT and the Chimera Foundation (Alwin Nikolais, Murray Louis and Betty Young).
- +"Case Studies On and Guidelines for the Programming and Planning of Public Educational Facilities as Community Cultural Resources."
- +"Case Studies On and Guidelines for the Conversion of University and College Clear Story Spaces to Multi-Purpose Arts Uses."
- +"The State of the Art of and Design Criteria for Acoustical Shells," a project of the newly established Engineering Subcommittee on Audio and Acoustics.
- +"A Prototypical Curriculum in Performing Arts Administration Training."
- +"Design Criteria for Stage Floors to Accomodate Dance," a collaborative project of USITT, Association of American Dance Companies and the American Guild of Musical Artists.

In addition to the foregoing, the following projects are actively in progress:

- +"Standardized Lighting Symbols," a project of the Engineering Committee.
- +"Road Show Advance Form," a project of the Presentation Committee.
- +"Stage Managers' Survey," a project of the Presentation Committee.

Regional section and student chapter activity are making this a banner year for USITT. At the presnt rate of new growth, we will have achieved a fifty per cent increase in membership for the two-year span from January 1,1969 to January 1,1971.
