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PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

THE YEAR BEHIND US

The interval between the annual conference last May and the coming one this month has been characterized by growth and development at a pace which makes it clear that we must meet our changing needs and obligations with firmness and clarity of action. It is with this knowledge and experience that a restructuring study has been requested.

RESTRUCTURING STUDY

The rationale for the restructuring study was twofold: 1) to improve the management and administration of our small but complex Institute in relation to outside forces and regional development, and 2) to increase the benefits and participation for the membership in the affairs, studies, projects, and general professional activities of the Institute.

To achieve these ends, recommendations which separate these two functions will be proposed, and the result should bring efficiency and a stronger national organization on the one hand, and a truly effective stress on the substantive aspects of the arts of the theatre and theatre technology on the other. The latter is the major concern, and the most essential. The changes which will be recommended in no way lessen the founding spirit of the Institute, but rather enhance it through emphasis and expansion.

THE INSTITUTE -- THEN AND NOW

The Institute is the only theatre organization in the United States which relates to all aspects of theatre. You will find, in the proposed goals and aims, a meaningful effort to concentrate on extending and developing the participation among all elements of the theatre. You will even find a proposal for a name change in response to the perennial requests to make our name fit all functions.

In keeping with the breadth of interest

and effort of the organization, The United States Theatre Institute will be recommended. It sounds right. It describes our function. It enhances and firms up the national image.

CORRECTION NOTICE: PIN PLUGS

The NEWSLETTER herewith withdraws information appearing on this subject in the last two issues.

The status of the pin plug has not changed. 1972 CONFERENCE

The USITT 12TH ANNUAL CONFERENCE will be held on March 25 to 29, 1972. An exciting program has been planned which should make this annual meeting the finest ever.

The theme of the Conference is "THE DESIGNER: ARTIST AND TECHNICIAN." Among the scheduled events are tours of several theatres in the San Francisco area, an Industry Show, and a Student Design Competition.

A feature of the Conference will be special clinics for in-depth demonstration and study. These will include: PLASTICS FOR THE THEATRE; PROJECTION TECHNIQUES FOR ALL BUDGETS; THEATRE MURALS; TELEVISION LIGHTING; MODEL STAGES AS TEACHING AIDS, as well as many others.

Panels will report on Hydraulics in the Theatre and Designing for the Thrust Stage. A Forum will be held for discussion of controversial subjects in the field.

MEMBERSHIP

The Section has been extending every effort to interest those in all theatrical activities in all areas of Florida in participating in USITT activities. Attention has been directed toward those in all forms of the theatre and allied activities. Particular effort has been directed toward interesting architects, engineers, and others who can influence theatre design.

OLYMPIA THEATRE TOUR

On January 8, 1972, the Florida Section met at the Olympia Theatre, where they were welcomed by retiring section chairman George Gill. Mr. Gill introduced representatives from the press, including reporters from the Miami Herald and News, and Coral Gables Times Guide. He then went on to introduce Executive Director Tom DeGaetani and the new Florida section officers (listed above).

As new chairman Jerry Bell was not present, the meeting was turned over to Larry Riddle, whose first official act was the commendation of George Gill, section founder and retiring chairman, for his work in the past on behalf of the Institute in Florida. Mr. Gill was given a standing ovation by those present.

Mr. Riddle then turned the meeting over to Mr. Gill for the introduction to the Olympia Theatre Tour. Mr. Gill gave a brief history of the theatre's past and its present plans for restoration. Mr. Maurice Gussman, who has bought the theatre for possible use as a home for the philharmonic, was also introduced.

PLANS FOR 1972

After the tour of the Olympia, the section had a general meeting during which discussion was centered on proposed program activities for the coming year. Included were plans for:

- 1) A short course for teachers of technical drama in the public schools.
- 2) Organization of a symposium on Theatre Administration.
- 3) Organization of a Symposium on Business and the Arts on the same format as that held in Chicago.

4) Discussion on how the performing arts curriculum can assist community colleges in meeting community service requirements.

5) Organization of a Symposium on Projected

Scenery to be held in the fall of '72.

6) Creation of more student chapters in the

Also discussed were the geographical limitation problems of the state, and it was suggested that the state be theoretically divided and events centered either in the northern or southern half of the state, with one statewide meeting per year. Larry Riddle was appointed to coordinate northern Florida activities and Pat Minnaugh was appointed to coordinate for southern activities. In addition, Larry Riddle was appointed liaison with the Florida Arts Council and all other business pertaining to the state.

Elsom Eldridge, Jr., Executive Director, Center for Creative Arts in Medfield; George Davis, Executive Director of the Boston Summer Thing Program; Royal Cloyd, Executive Director, Boston Center for the Arts; Hazel Bryant, Artistic Director, Afro-American Total Theatre; and Jan Wamp-ler, Assistant Professor of Architecture at MIT.

MODEL OF GROPIÚS' TOTAL THEATRE

Plans are well under way for the exhibition at the Fogg Museum in Cambridge of the work and concepts of the late Walter Gropius. Included in the exhibit, scheduled for March 11 through April 9, is a model of Gropius' "Total Theatre." It is expected that the model will be exhibited in other cities in the future.

MEETING PLANS FOR THE SPRING

An April Section Meeting is planned for Saturday the 8th, on the subject of "The Use of Models in the Theatre." A 6 May meeting will be on the subject of Building Codes, and a USITT/NETC General Meeting is planned for 3 June.

MIDWEST SECTION

THEATRE PARTY; TOUR OF THEATRES

BUSINESS AND THE ARTS SYMPOSIUM

An all-day USITT National Symposium entitled "Business and the Arts" and focussed on the collaboration of the two communities, was hosted by the Midwest Section on 4 February at the Museum of Science and Industry. full report on the proceedings appears in the Administration Supplement of this Newsletter.

MARCH MEETING ON LIGHTING CONTROL SYSTEMS

The Section's March meeting, on the topic of lighting control systems, was held on Friday, March 3, at the Chicago Lighting Institute, and conducted by Albert Koga, former chairman and founding member of USITT/Mid-Koga, long associated with theatre control system designs, is chief engineer of the Hub Electric Company.

The meeting began with a discussion and history of control boards up to the present development of SCR boards and sophisticated control features. The meeting continued with an examination of the variety of features and types of modern control systems, and the advantages, limitations, and applications of recent memory storage systems were discussed.

In addition, consideration was given to the selection of control boards for different applications, their relative costs, and their comparative advantages.

HIGH SCHOOL AFFILIATION

MEETING ON THE PLASTIC EXPERIENCE

An event preceding the above election meeting was held on Friday evening, 11 February, and entitled: The Plastic Experience.

Offered by USITT/Texas as a part of the Texas Educational Theatre Association's Annual Convention, as well as a USITT membership activity, the event included discussion of plastic and plastic related materials in theatrical applications. Coordinated by Fred March, of Southwest Texas State University, the event included demonstrations of a low-cost styrofoam lathe, a home-made vacuumform machine, and the use of styrene components for visual effects. After the demonstrations, attendees were urged to try the various processes for themselves, and a number of the more than seventy who attended tested the techniques first-hand.

Others involved in the event included national P.A.T.E. Chairman John Rothgeb, as well as members of the Student Chapter of the University of Texas at Austin.

TOUR OF AMERICAN PLACE THEATRE

On February 19th, following the meeting of the New York Section at which new officers were announced, those assembled were shown through the American Place Theatre by Barbara Leslie Cortesi, a member of the design team, which, under the direction of Richard D. Kaplan. Architect, developed the concept for the APT.

The American Place Theatre, a notably successful design, is expecially significant in that it is the first completely new theatre to be built in New York in more than three decades. PRESIDENT WALTERS HONORED

At a ceremony on February 29 at the Pennsylvania State Capitol in Harrisburg, USITT President Walter H, Walters was honored for his contributions to the worlds of Theatre and Education. Governor of Pennsylvania Shaap's citation read as follows:

As the President of the U.S. Institute for Theatre Technology, Dr. Walter H. Wal-ters has furnished national leadership in the study and application of contemporary technologies and administrative practices to the performing arts in education and society. As Dean of the College of Arts and Architecture, the Pennsylvania State University, he has pioneered in developing programs which incorporate profitable interaction between the professional performing artist on the one hand and the educator, the architect, the environmentalist and the social scientist on the other to the benefit of students in all of these areas. Dr. Walters has also served on the Pennsylvania Council on the Arts, as Director of the University and College Theatre Association and on the International Council of Fine Arts Deans.

He represents that fusion of humanistic and aesthetic concerns which is animated by a conviction that the arts are uniquely relevant to the human condition and that the artist is uniquely equipped, not only to reflect and synthesize that condition, but to improve it.

The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania is proud to confer this citation on a man who has distinguished himself through service to his fellow man.

INTERNATIONAL LIAISON

FOUR YEAR PROGRAM OUTLINED

International Liaison Chairman Dr. Joel E. Rubin reports that the Committee hosted a luncheon meeting on January 13th for representatives from allied organizations, the State Department, the U.S. Information Agency, and interested foundation representatives

A four-year program outlining Committee activity was presented, which included consideration of the following points:

1) Meetings of the OISTT Program Com-

mission and OISTT Executive Commission in Poland, February 15-19, 1972.

2) Proposed meetings of the Executive

Commission and Publication Commission in the

United States in October, 1972.

It was noted that these two commissions are chaired by Americans who have an obligation to hold meetings in the year between OISTT Congresses. A publications committee meeting in the United States could be expected not only to provide valuable cultural interchange, but to aid in:

a) working out a system for multi-lan-

guage abstracts of principal articles appearing in the world's fifteen or so journals

which regularly report on theatre architecture, scenography, and technology.

b) advance the publication of the OISTT International Dictionary of Technical Theatre

d) promote OISTT communications through publication of a Journal and a Newsletter.

d) make possible the publication of the OISTT International Guide to Principal Theatre Buildings.

3) Meetings of OISTT Commissions on Scenography, Theatre Architecture, Training, and Engineering. If and when such meetings occur, effective U.S. representation will be

necessary.
4) 3rd Congress of OISTT in June, 1973. The probable location for the 3rd Congress is Budapest. The United States delegation must be tailored both to the subject matter of the Congress (not as yet determined) and to the work of the various OISTT Commissions.
5) 4th Congress of the OISTT in con-

junction with the Prague Quadriennale '75, Prague, June 1975.
