1972 CONFERENCE

Who? What? When & Where? Begin with USITTers gathering for an annual conference: then when: March 26th through 29th, which turned out to be the best you could hope of spring; then add where: San Francisco -- unarguably one of the world's most beautiful cities, and, blessed with supremely good planning - you have one hell of a successful get-to-gether. And such, I'm convinced, anyone who attended, found the '72 Conference to be.

Opening on Saturday the 25th (a day before the official beginning of festivities) with the judging of the first USITT Design Competition, things got formally underway with the opening of the Industry Show and Design Competition Show on Sunday, a day ending in a reception at The Top of The Mark Hopkins at which the planned-for cash bar was free, accidentally. Either USITTers attending forgot how much they drank at that happy affair, or else -- more likely -- USITT was unexpected host to imbibing tourists who happened through during the festivities, for subsequent pleas to remit to the Conference treasury were not entirely successful.

Monday was marked by a morning forum, and tours of Zellerbach Hall at the University of California at Berkeley and the San Francisco Opera House in the afternoon.

Tuesday investigated a seminar on the Design Applications of Scenic Projection, and also included clinics at San Francisco State College on Plastics in the Theatre, Portable/Economical Theatrical Sound Systems and Recording Units, Low and Medium Budget Projection Techniques, Photographic Murals. the Theatre Organization Package organized by the Architecture Committee and presented in SFby Derek Hunt, a workship on Teaching Technical Theatre, and another on Basic Music Editing. In addition there were clinics on Prop Techniques, Sculpture, Remote Operated Sound Effects Devices, Elevation of Stage Platforms, Smoke Projection, and a pot pourri of

stage effect items and ideas entitled: Show and Tell.

On Wednesday, the seminar on Scenic Movement: The Designer's Dilemma, was heavily attended, as was, of course, the General Membership Meeting at mid-day. The afternoon was filled with seminars on Designing for Thrust Stages, and a later one on the Designer and the Director, both before a final reception preceding the Awards Banquet, held in the Mark Hopkins' Peacock Court. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, USITT
recognizes and reaffirms its responsibilities
and committments to the "Majority" (Nonestablishment) and "Minority" (establishment)
cultures and therefore directs its National
Administration Committee to continue and expand activities, national and regional, interand intra-organizational, which are calculated
to promote collaboration amongst the arts on
all levels and the private, governmental and
educational sources for development, support
and expansion of the arts on a regional and
national level.

RESPONSE TO THE USITT FOUNDERS AWARD. - 1972

Mr. Chairman, Mr. President, Mr. Past President, Fellow Members of USITT, Honored Guests:

You must forgive my absence, especially upon this occasion. A long-standing personal commitment prevents being with you at a 12th consecutive USITT Conference.

I am deeply appreciative of this Award.

If the Founders Award is made for <u>hours</u> of service it may just possibly be deserved. My family -- (and I am afraid my employer also)-- is intimately aware of the tens of hundreds of hours that must have been spent by now.

Perhaps the award is given for the distinction of finally having completed the Consultant's List project. I was the first -- and the last-- but not the only Chairman of the Committee. The project has been completed but it was surely the longest non-active project in USITT archives, having originated eleven years ago.

Or, did the Awards Committee simply decide it ought to honor some arch member of the USITT's "New York mafia."

He has since been a designer-tech director at the University of North Dakota, Stanford, and the University of Pittsburgh, completing a PhD at Stanford with a dissertation on theatre architecture.

Since 1960 he has served on the theatre staff of the University of Pittsburgh, being involved along the way as Theatre Design and Technology's first editor (1965-70), and founding Arts Information International (1970), an arts information center.

SERVICES & RESEARCH

Present plans call for publication of Project Supplements to be resumed with the next NEWSLETTER. In the interim, this issue's Services & Research page is given over to the following message from the Institute's newly-elected Technical Secretary, Edward F. Kook. The title "Technical Secretary" will change to "Second Vice-President" on July 1.

To the Membership:

USITT has a primary committment to disseminate information and facilitate communication for the professional development of its members. USITT means to broaden and heighten the quality of its research and investigation in the fields of theatre planning and design, construction, equipment, aesthetics, presentation and operations through the Commissions on Administration, Architecture, Codes, Engineering, Performing Arts Training and Education, and Presentation Technology. And so it will work to uncover the new, the different, and the unique as they relate to all visual and aural phases in the world of living theatre. And it will make them known through seminars and publications.

As is reported elsewhere in this issue of the NEWSLETTER, the Board of Directors approved a new set of By-Laws in San Francisco. The following excerpts from those By-Laws relate directly to USITT's research

process:

"A Commission on Projects shall be established to promote, recognize and provide assistance to the project activities of the Corporation. The Commission shall endorse specific projects and appoint Project Directors. Projects recognized by the Commission may be conducted by one person or a group of many, regional or national in scope and for short term or long term study. Project Directors shall be expected to submit regular reports on the progress of the project and a final report. A project shall continue to have the endorsement of the Commission as long as it shows satisfactory progress and productivity. The Commission shall submit the results and reports for potential dissemination to the members of the Corporation through its regular publications and project supplements....

"The Commission on Projects shall be administered by Commissioners who have special expertise in specific theatre fields. They shall be appointed by the President of the Corporation and serve under the chairmanship of the Second Vice-President.

"The Commissioners shall be selected from a variety of specialized fields of theatre such as, but not limited to, Administration,

Architecture, Codes, Engineering, Performing Arts Training and Education, and Theatrical Presentation.

"The Commissioners may establish committees, advisory groups and project groups in their efforts to stimulate and coordinate projects. The Commissioners shall submit annual reports to the Board of Directors."

SVOBODA VISIT

On behalf of USITT and OISTT, Dr. Joel E. Rubin -- USITT International Liaison Chairman and OISTT President -- is coordinating a series of visits around the country by Josef Svoboda, internationally famous Czech designer-architect.

It is hoped that Svoboda will be able to visit college and university design programs, meet with area USITTers, and also be able to work with selected numbers of design students on play assignments which he will select.

Dr. Rubin is counting on USITT regional sections to aid in coordinating this effort wherever possible.

AADC CONFERENCE

The Association of American Dance Companies will hold its Annual Conference on 8-11 June at New York University. Keynote speaker at the conference will be Nancy Hanks, Chairman of the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Conference will feature workshops and panels dealing with administrative concerns concerned with the relationship of arts councils to industry.

TEXAS SHORT COURSE

The Technical Theatre Short Course Extension on Stage Lighting was held at the Incarnate Word College in San Antonio.

Local arrangements were handled by Sister Germaine Corbin. The instructors were David Deacon, Secretary of the Texas Section, and Andy Gibbs, the First Vice-chairman. Approximately sixty people attended the course, which was directed largely at high school and community theatre personnel. The successful day's work ran from eight in the morning until four in the afternoon. Our thanks go to the Incarnate Word College for a grant to cover the expenses of the instructors.

The next session of the Short Course will be held September 15 and 16 at the Drama Department of the University of Texas at Austin. Local Arrangements will be handled by National PATE Chairman John Rothgeb.

The Short Course is open to anyone interested in basic techniques of theatrical instruction, aimed primarily at high school and community theatre personnel. The registration fee will be \$12.50, and will include a banquet at the close of the course.
