St. Louis Conference ---A Smash Hit

If you were there, you know. If you weren't, well, you missed something quite rare...a productive, joyful and truly stimulating conference. Thanks to Conference Chairman Peter Sargent and his army of aides, there was absolutely no opportunity to be bored.

Sandwiched between tours of the remodeled Powell Symphony Hall, Washington University's Edison Theatre complex, and the thrust-stage Loretto Hilton Center's Repertory Theatre were all manner of enticing discussion groups. Several sessions dealt with theatre administration (road touring, training for arts management, front-of-house operations); others touched all bases, including demonstrations of portable grids, winches and stages, makeup for film, the AARP synthesizer, plastic welding and flexible urethane foam (something for everyone, indeed!)

Keynote speaker at the Monday night banquet was Mr. Jo Mielziner, who discussed the questions "How Dependent is the Artist on the Engineer? How Dependent is the Engineer on the Artist?"

Four outstanding individuals received USITT awards at the banquet: Dr. Harold Burris-Meyer - annual Founder's Award; Prof. A. S. Gillette - Award for Lifetime Contribution to the American Theatre; Frank Silberstein - Annual Publication Award for his article in the December Journal, "Field Constructed Long Radius Tubing Bender"; and a special award to Mr. Jarka Burian for his outstanding book, The Scenography of Josef Svoboda.

Two major successes were the premiere of the Architecture Commission's Theatre Orientation Package Slide Show of selected theatres built since 1960, and the Jonell Polansky/Robert Slutske paper on "Synthesizing Remote Controlled Systems in the Performing Arts" (which sparked a Great Debate).

New York City will host the 1974 Conference (April 18-21, for those who like to plan ahead). And in 1975 -- Disneyland! (the West Coast one, that is). The success of the St. Louis Conference has set some very high standards for N.Y. and California to live up to. Here's to bigger and better things in the coming years!

ARCHITECTURE AGONISTES

HELP! The Theatre Orientation Package Slide Show was presented for the first time at the St. Louis Conference. A flyer was distributed there, stating that the slide show plus written commentary could be rented for \$15 for not longer than two weeks, or purchased for \$40. It has since been discovered that the purchase price will be perhaps double the original figure.

MASTER CLASSES BY GROSSER SET FOR NOV.

HELMUT GROSSER, Technical Director of the Cologne Opera, and Editor of the <u>Buhmentechnische Rundschau</u>, has agreed to conduct a series of Master Classes in the U.S. during November of this year.

USITT's International Liaison Committee plans to continue the successful format established in the Josef Svoboda lectures of last November. Thus, each regional section of USITT is being offered first opportunity to put together a collective of participating colleges and universities in their region. Following this, individual institutions or collectives outside of the regional sections will be eligible for the Grosser classes.

As with the Svoboda classes, leading students from the participating institutions will join in the intensive three-day series of master classes in each region. Grosser (who is fluent in English) will work with a maximum of perhaps 25-30 students in each regional seminar, although he will deliver a public lecture for a wider audience, as well.

It has been said of Grosser that he not only understands, but commands the problems of true repertory production. Although only in his mid-forties, he has worked and lectured extensively throughout Europe; his position at Cologne is one of the three or four most demanding in the German technical theatre. Grosser's background in repertory theatre and opera is expected to appeal to not only technical and design students in opera and theatre, and to students in theatre administration and management, but also to a larger music and theatre group.

THE LATEST WORDS FROM OUR COMMISSIONS

Engineering

Three very important and interesting projects are moving along nicely under the Committee's sponsorship. (1) Several meetings have been held and preliminary tests made for the Stage Floors for Dance project, a joint venture of USITT's Engineering and Theatre Architecture Committees, AADC and ACMA. (2) Centralized vs. Fragmented Control Systems has been retitled Synthesizing Remote Controlled Systems in the Performing Arts. This project was presented in a lively seminar at the St. Louis Convention. (3) A Method of Lighting Dance Tours has been accepted for undertaking, costs to be underwritten by AADC. This project may be completed by the end of 1973.

PATE

All USITT members are urged to send sample auditorium/production groundplans to Mr. Paul Camp, Dept. of Drama, Univ. of Georgia, Athens, Ga. 30601. Mr. Camp is currently engaged in a PATE project aiming to develop a recommended series of standard plan view symbols for groundplans (excluding electrics). He needs samples from as many sources as possible in order to have some basis of comparison.

In cooperation with the Education Committee of OISTT, PATE Commission is attempting to gather technical theatre curricula from all over the U.S. to send to various international meetings for examination. These curricula will also aid PATE in its efforts to study the need for minimum standards in theatre design and technology in this country. Membership

Under the conscientious chairmanship of James Campbell, USITT's 1972-73 Membership Directory was completed and mailed in mid-March. Chairman Campbell's Commission is now preparing a long-needed addendum to the Directory, Membership by States & Countries.

 ${\rm Good\ news}$: total USITT membership has increased approximately 14% in the six-month period from June, 1972 (1408 members) to February, 1973 (1615 members). We gratefully note the addition of seven sustaining members during the past year.

Presentation

The major activity of the Commission for the year was the completion of the discursive report on the Theatre Association of Pennsylvania/Pennsylvania Council on the Arts "Pilot Survey of Performing Arts Facilities in Pennsylvania." Consisting of 32 Acco-bound volumes, each containing one theatre survey and a report of several hundred pages, the Report traces the evolution of USITT's "Road Show Form."

The third bi-annual congress of OISTT takes place in Avignon, France, July 16-22 on the subject "Light-Sound-and the Theatre Space." Emphasis will be on productions which exemplify new uses of theatre spaces and the possibilities of light and sound in such productions. Conference sessions will deal with this subject area in the mornings, with afternoons devoted to work sessions and papers of the OISTT Commissions on Architecture, Scenography, Technical Theatre, Education and Publications. Morning sessions will have simultaneous translation between English and French, and possibly German. For the afternoon meetings, a working knowledge of French or German would be helpful.
