More details just in on the 1974 Student Design Competition: there will be four categories judged, Graduate Scenic and Graduate Costume Design, and Undergraduate Scenic and Undergraduate Costume Design. "Graduate" includes professional schools and open categories; "Undergraduate" includes high school students. Judging will be done by a panel of professional and educational theatre people and in each of the four entry categories awards of \$75 (1st prize), \$50 (2nd prize) and \$25 (3rd prize) will be made. All entries will be displayed at the Waldorf throughout the Conference.

# NEW THEATRE RESOURCE

An invaluable new research tool has just begun publication -- The Theatre/Drama and Speech Index. Published by the Theatre/Drama and Speech Information Center, the Index is international and will index over 60 journals from fifteen countries, in addition to pamphlets, bibliographies, unpublished research and articles on theatre and drama appearing in speech journals. It also will feature a listing of play reviews and scripts.

### pate

(PERFORMING ARTS TRAINING AND EDUCATION)

All PATE projects are operating at full speed now, in anticipation of presenting final reports at the National Conference. Chairman Randy Earle has urgently requested assistance from the entire USITT membership in order to complete two of PATE's

major projects:

(1) Send ground plans from productions which you have designed (for PATE's project on Ground Plan Symbol Standardization), along with any symbol specification sheets which you may use in your institution or firm, to: Paul Camp, Dept. of Drama, Univ. of Georgia, Áthens, GA 30601. To date, only one plan has been received -- despite this same plea's appearance in the past two NEWSLETTERS. Please, PATE needs everyone's help in order to complete

this project. (2) Technical theatre educators: PATE needs copies of plans of study for programs in technical theatre, design and management on the B.A., B.F.A., M.A. and M.F.Ā. levels. Ādditionally, descriptions of course content, when available, would be of great value to various subcommittees of the Minimum Standards project. Please send two of each document, so that PATE can forward copies to the OISTT Education Commission via its liaison, Will Bellman. All available materials should be sent to: James R. Earle, Jr., Dept. of Drama, San Jose State Univ., San Jose, CA 95192. NOTE: a number of schools sent materials last spring, which were forwarded to the OISTT meeting. If you did so, you need send only one copy of each document for the PATE files.

Tom\_Beagle, Chairman of PATE's Secondary Education Technical Theatre Training Project, reports that the Vocational Education Dept. at Antioch (Calif.) High School has submitted a proposal for an Interdisciplinary Distributive Education Model which will include the Theatre, Commerical, Art, Home Economics and Industrial Arts Depts. This means that Theatre Design, Technical and Business programs can be developed which may provide curriculum models for other secondary schools. Here's an active demonstration of PATE's function -- to expand and develop performing arts training and education in as many ways as possible.

### membership

The Committee on Membership recently made a study of the distribution of membership throughout North America. Using the information supplied by the 1972-73 Membership Directory, members were charted on maps of the continent. Clusters of the membership were studied and membership within a 100-mile radius of a major city or group of cities was identified. A sampling of the results:

Given USITT By-Laws' requirement of fifteen members needed to establish a Regional Section, it's clear to the Committee that there is considerable potential for the development of new Sections in many areas. It's been found in the past that interest developed by the activities of a Regional Section has usually doubled or tripled membership in a given area.
