OVER 900 ATTEND KANSAS CITY CONFERENCE

On March 12, because of undesirable weather conditions, the balloon never went up! Nevertheless, the 1980 USITT Annual Conference in Greater Kansas City took off and soared without benefit of too much hot air!

At 1:00 on Wednesday, March 12, President Charles Williams officially opened the Conference and welcomed the attendees. Jean Eckart, noted theatrical designer and educator gave the keynote address to more than 300 already assembled for the four-day Conference. Before it was over, more than 900 people were tallied by the Conference Committee. Congratulations are certainly in order for Co-Chairmen Frank Stewart and Henry Tharp for a great job well done. All of the various committees performed their duties so well, and we thank them for all the effort.

In addition to the wonderful support of all our exhibitors, (all 50 of them) which was shown by one of the most successful product and educational exhibits we have ever seen, a truly rewarding sight was the First Biennial Scenography Exposition displayed in one section of the exhibit hall. Not to mention, the Exposition Catalog which made it on schedule, thanks to the strong wills (and arms) of Arnold Aronson and Kate Davy, editors of Theatre Design and Technology!

The many and various commission sessions and minisessions will be covered in the next issue of the Newsletter (Post Conference Issue), as all the reports flow in, so only the major sessions and highlights will be covered here. On Wednesday afternoon an exciting and wellattended session was sponsored by the Theatre Architecture Commission covering "Theatre Consulting/Design for the 80's" dealing with what progress has been made in building good theatres, what is needed for the 80's and the qualification of theatre consultants.

Wednesday evening two sessions were held simultaneously dealing with professional employment possibilities in the Midwest in repertory theatre, theme parks and specialty houses sponsored by the Costume Commission, and a discussion of camera positions, power requirements and facilities for broadcast in both new and existing theatres. The latter session was sponsored by the Engineering Commission. The last session of the day's program, sponsored by Liaison with the Artist featured Carol Bolt, a Canadian Playwright and Fred Gaines, resident playwright at Lawrence University in Wisconsin.

One of the highlights of Thursday's program was the Scenography Commission's discussion and visual presentation of the life, times and influence of Jo Mielziner. Thursday evening there was great interest in the discussion to determine fair methods for presenting lighting design in expositions, exhibits and competitions.

On Friday, the Education Commission got to shine with the outline of editorial guidelines, scope and objectives for the K-12 Technical Theatre Course Guide.

During all of this activity many "Hand's On" workshops, gallery talks, and tours such as the Folger Library were also keeping attendees moving all the time.

Saturday morning, busses took USITT to the Helen F. Spencer Center for the Performing Arts at the University of Missouri-Kansas City for the Annual General Membership Meeting, after which there were many workshops and tours, bringing the membership back to the Conference site just in time for the cocktail party prior to the Annual Ban-

Fellow Awards were presented to Randall W. A. Davidson, USITT Health and Safety Commissioner; Thomas M. Lemons, President of TLA Lighting Consultants and a past Secretary of the Institute; Lee Watson, our new President; and Charles E. Williams, out-going President of the Institute. Section Charters were presented to three new regional sections formed in the past year: USITT/Southwest Section, USITT/Northern Boundary Section, and USITT/Alberta Section; and to three Student Chapters at Northern Arizona University, Flagstaff; Southwest Texas State University, San Marcos and Tarleton State University, Stephenville, Texas. We welcome this activity, and look forward to the establishment of several new sections and many student chapters before the year is out.

Upon receipt of the USITT Award, Theodore Fuchs gave a wonderful re-counting of his experiences and was most entertaining. Support for the coctail party in his honor was funded by Northwestern University, and we thank them for this wonderful form of recognition both for Ted and the USITT.

Needless to say, the highlight of the closing banquet was the USITT Award presentation to Geoffrey Holder for his work in all areas of the theatre. Geoffrey accepted the award by creating "magic" for the audience with his encouragement for all to "be mad" in everything they do in the theatre.

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For many who attended, the balloon atmosphere created by the Conference Committee has still not deflated.

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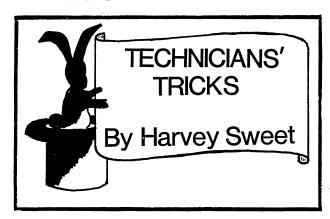

A CALL TO ARMS

It is time for all technicians and designers to stand back and look at all of the exciting and innovative solutions you have discovered and have applied to your work in the theatre. This column is constantly looking for ideas to share with colleagues in the profession. Here are a few that have recently been received.

Cosmo A. Catalano, Jr., Pennsylvania State University has resolved at least one of the difficulties experienced when dealing with Styrofoam. Rather than using the mastic-type of foam bard cement, which in addition to being flammable, toxic, difficult to spread, and difficult to clean up, also requires clamping until complete drying is achieved, an acrylic latex contact cement (such as Elmer's Professional Cabinetmaker's Acrylic Latex Contact Cement) is used. This contact cement is non-toxic, non-flammable, water soluable until it dries, and dries clear and fairly flexible. As with other contact cements, bonding is immediate upon contact of two coated surfaces, thus eliminating the need for clamping.

The adhesive is used by coating two surfaces to be joined with a brush or roller. After 30 to 40 minutes drying time the coated surfaces are pressed together.

Repositioning is difficult, thus it is suggested that alignment of pieces to be joined is done with an intermediate piece of kraft that is slipped out after pieces have been positioned. The material has been tested with Styrofoam, Ethafoam, and wood bonds, and finally, this cleaner, safer, easier to use adhesive is competitive in cost with other mastics.

John Howard from Mount Holyoke College suggests a simple and convenient tie-off system for electric cables on battens. Prepare tie-lines of cotton rope with a large S-hook that will wrap under cables on a pipe and hold them in place during a show. The tie-offs can be permanently installed and used from show to show on electric pipes..

Quick columns: The construction industry offers a variety of materials that can be applied to theatrical construction. One of the handiest products available is called Sonotube, a cardboard-like tube that is available in diameters as small as 12" and as large as 36" in 10' lengths that may be used for lightweight, instant columns. The cardboard-like material may be shortened, tapered, etc., using normal cutting tools for wood. The material is used by construction trades as forms for concrete columns. Concrete suppliers in your area should be able to order it for you.

For all of us, with limited budgets, who find ourselves in the position of having to construct and/or design various types of drive mechanisms, either for

special effects or working props, the <u>Handbook of Small Standardized Components</u> is a must addition for any shop. The catalog is divided into ten product sections, each with its own full-color photographic and descriptive index.

Major product groups include belt and chain drives, gears, speed reducers, motors, couplings, universal joints and flexible shafts, counters, shafts and bearings, fasteners, vibration mounts and unique components, such as constant force springs, splined bushings and industrial 'V' guides. The catalog features 133 pages of new components which include small belt and chain drives, micro D. C. motors, plus electromechanical and and mechanical counters. There are over 1,358 inch and 1,479 metric gears offered along with 2,781 inch and 1,857 metric pulley sizes in 6 different materials.

There is also a section containing useful technical tables, such as: conversion to small inch measurements, standards for inch size threads, American/metric equivalents and standards for metric threads. Although there is a \$4.95 price tag on the catalog, it is a worthwhile investment. The catalog is available from:

INTERNATIONAL LIAISON

For the exploration of ways to collaborate with Chinese Technical Theatre organizations: Commerce, Consultation and Theatre Arts, the USITT in conjunction with The Institute for Theatre Science and Technology of China, have planned a USITT China Trip November 11th thru November 28, 1980. Details are as follows:

Peking, Nanking, Shanghai, Hangchow, Chenchian (via Northwest Airlines and Pakistan International Airlines).

<u>Point of Departure</u>: New York City or Seattle, Washington.

<u>Purpose of trip</u> will be to provided maximum opportunity to explore ways for bringing USA technological and artistic resources to China, and the reverse. Emphasis will be on professional contacts, rather than sightseeing.

Maximum number of visas available: 34 (minimum to make trip: 20).

The organization reserves the right to cancel trip and refund deposit if minimum has not been met. Last date to cancel trip is September 10, 1980. There is no way to enlarge group beyond 34 persons.

Trip is open only to members of USITT and their spouses.

<u>Coordinating organizations:</u> The Chinese Institute for Theatre Science and Technology, via Chinese International Travel Service. C.I.T.S., a government office, will make arrangements with Chinese market people. The Chinese theatre organization is our counterpart group, and very new. We are using their collaboration on con-

tacts with Chinese theatre people. If need for television contacts exists, we will also solicit cooperation of the Chinese Broadcasting Institute.

USITT is also coordinating the trip with these two government agencies:

US Department of State, China Desk Officer

People's Republic of China Washington Embassy (Second Secretary)

COST: \$3,050, plus imposed fuel supplements. A \$250 non-refundable deposit, payable to the Peking Travel & Tours should accompany letter of application qualifying you. Balance of payment is payable by September 10, 1980. Organization reserves the right to cancel trip by September 10, 1980, and refund deposit.

USITT makes no representation and assumes no liability for the trip. The opportunity to make the trip is offered at no profit as a service to its membership.

Optional Supplements: There are possibilities for post-China supplements to this tour at very attractive rates. For example: 4-days in Cairo, Memphis, and Sakkara would cost about \$250 additional (Modified American Plan, double occupancy, Hilton, or equivalent) if elected by a smaller group.

(Around-the-world fares are essentially the same as return through Tokyo.)

SIMPLE SAVINGS

Inflation forces us all to look at things differently. As costumers, inflation forces us to look at RIBBON, FLOWER, AND LEAF prices and say "EEEK!" But once we gather ourselves up and look at a few simple alternatives, life is not so bleak.

Run, do not walk, to your nearest drapery material counter. There is curtain fabric on the current market with satin RIBBONS incorporated in its pattern. The 45" to 56" wide fabric has some 20 ribbons. They are placed every inch or so, separated by intermittent sheer synthetic ribbons. They are all joined by a loose stitch which can be cut to free all ribbons, keeping them intact without raw or fraying edges. At least eight colors are available, mainly pastels. COSMAK spotted said fabric on sale for \$1.00 per yard; with a store coupon, it ended up \$.88 cents per yard. Imagine ... I yard with some 20 yards of narrow satin and 10-20 yards of sheer ribbons! Compare current ribbon prices such as these. The little time it takes to cut apart ribbons is worth the time and energy.

Prices of flowers are unbelievable too! When you think of the amounts of flowers needed to carry adequate statement and dimension across the stage to a large audience, it is almost prohibitive. Reach down in your bag of simple and inexpensive techniques, and one of them could be the following: Choose light-weight chiffon-like fabric (look at curtain counter again), or more textured or even heavy upholstery fabric of your choice. Cut into perfect circles or petaled circles (use cardboard pattern or just cut free-form using thumb as petal pattern for some consistency). Circles can vary in diameter from 1" to 5" or more depending on statement desired. Using heavier fabrics, one layer may be sufficient. With light-weight fabrics (like chiffon), use at least two layers. Layers can be same or slightly graduating in size. Same size works fine. Fold material to cut as many as possible as your finger-strength and scissors will allow. Sharp scissors are less frustrating. Dilute white glue. Strength of glue will depend on how stiff you desire end result or weight or contents of fabric used. Even some sheer synthetics need a bit stronger glue as they resist diluted glue. With brush, dab or stroke center of circle, place second layer on top of first, dab center of second layer with glue also. Squeeze, fold, neatly arrange or just ripple base so center of circle forms point and petal-edges form flower. Place pointed crushed base under just about anything until it drys (realizing you are dealing with glued items). A neater, more controlled drying method is to use styrofoam packing pieces, or foil or other glue-resistant covered cardboard, corrugated cardboard, or wood; straight pin crushed base to board until dry.

In addition to flowers, LEAVES can be quick, simple and lovely. For those really quick and inexpensive jobs, LEAVES can be used in lieu of FLOWERS. (They cover and finish off RIBBION originations very nicely.) Refer above to types and size of materials to be used. The simplest shape to cut is an elongated heart. It is best, especially with sheer fabrics, to use two layers. The bottom layer should be larger than the top layer. More interest and dimension occur if top layer is a different shade of color than lower layer. Layers can be joined with a fine line of glue down center of leaf or just tack to garment with a few stitches down center of leaf. Leaves seem to retain flexibility and flutter without glue. Gluing is just another step which can be eliminated with lovely results remaining.

Don't skimp on amounts of RIBBONS, FLOWERS, or LEAVES used on costumes. If items are expensive and you can only afford a few and you try and "make do", it always makes the statement, "These were expensive, and I tried to make do with a few I could afford." Search, and out of small amounts of yardage, you can produce hundreds of lovely RIBBONS, FLOWERS, and LEAVES. These are but a few ideas on how to beat inflation and not remind audiences that everyone is feeling the pinch of inflation. Results can be easy, yet exciting!

USITT/ALBERTA SECTION First Annual Conference

The newly chartered Alberta Section of USITT will be holding its First Annual Conference at the Citadel Theatre in Edmonton, Alberta, Canada, May 30th through June 1, 1980. Because of the extreme interest and enthusiasm in Alberta, the Section's First Annual Conference is exceedingly ambitious, but with enthusiastic support of Albertans, it all seems to be falling into place, with 95% of the preliminary/tentative schedule already set. Many members of the Institute should be interested in the conference because of the people the Section has managed to attract. Delegates from all over North America have been attracted to the conference, and considerable interest has been voiced from Vancouver, Regina, Winnipeg, and Toronto. (And nothing official has been mailed as of this writing).

Some of the people involved with the conference will be Richard Pilbrow, Theatre Consultant and Author, of Theatre Projects Limited, London, England, who will give a session on Theatre Architecture and Consulting; Dr. Robert R. Scales, University of Washington-Seattle, who will hold a session on air, pneumatics and technical tricks; Bob Gibson, Sound Engineer for the Calgary Stampede who will give a session on Sound for Decision Makers; Dr. Frank Fargo, Ph.D. Chemical Engineering, participating on a panel for safety and on-hand for paint practicum; Tom Corbett, University of California-Santa Cruz, who will conduct a session on honeycomb paper; Maurice Taylor, Occupational Health and Safety, Government of Alberta, who will also participate on the Safety Seminar panel; Mr. Bisset, Government of Canada, Engineering, Mines and Resources, Explosives Division, who will give a session on fireworks (after this fourhour session, attendees are licensed to handle fireworks -- an important consideration in Canada where fire marshalls are diligent even regarding flash pots); and Ted Pollock, National Marketing Director of Cal-Western Paints and an expert on toxics in paints, who will also participate on the panel for safety.

The Alberta Section hopes that many of the USITT membership will attend the First Annual Conference to help make it a resounding success.

ROCKY MOUNTAIN SECTION USA: A New Approach

"To disseminate information and facilitate communication for the professional development of its members." This is the statement of purpose for the USITT. The members of the Rocky Mountain Section of USITT have taken that statement to heart and go about that business with great enthusiasm. In each of the four yearly meetings that the section holds they have tried to communicate the knowledge and experience of the business to the younger or less experienced members.

The method by which this information is passed along must be creative lest the information become dull and dry. With the advent of the many publications concerning the USA exams, the Rocky Mountain Section hit upon a good vehicle to carry an overview of the lighting process.

In order to insure that potential USA members have the necessary qualifications and skills for their craft and examination is administered to the applicants. This examination is a microcosm of the overall process of lighting a show. By taking this examination outline and extending the time sequences, we can in a short period of time go through the entire process.

On September 22, 1979, the RMUSITT set about to try out this method. They contacted Johanna Ramsey and Gary Hjalmers, instructors in theatre and music at the Skyline High School in Longmont, Colorado. Skyline has a beautiful new facility consisting of a "Black box" and a nice 1,500 seat proscenium theatre. The event was announced in the Section Newsletter and by special flyer to members of the section, high schools and colleges in the area.

The program was outlined to begin at 8:30 a.m. and run to 4:30 p.m. In order to maintain a continuity throughout, Scott Roth, Technical Director/Lighting Designer and Technical Theatre Instructor at Denver University acted as the main moderator, lecturer, instructor, designer and guru. Scott had taken the USA Lighting examination and was familiar with the sequence of events.

Seventy people registered for the days activities. They included students, instructors, professional theatre people and the RMUSITT staff.

To start, Scott gave a description of the USA examination in great detail and explained that those attending would try to execute one part of the examination taking eight hours to complete what would have to be done in twenty minutes in the real examination. The exercise covered the practical portion of the exam. A scene was shown without any lighting then those attending went about the business of lighting that scene. In the exercise many detours were taken to explain each step taken and each piece of equipment used. This introduction took place in the black box theatre in order to give the maximum dimension between the scene in rehearsal and the "final product".

The project scene was one from Tennessee Williams' Eccentricities of a Nightingale, between Alma and Dr. John. The scene was done without scenery with only two chairs to represent a park bench. At the conclusion of the scene a short discussion was held regarding the approach of the director and the designers and their influence on the scene.

Moving into the proscenium theatre the group took a detour to do a very fast explanation of the kinds of equipment that would be used to create the lighting for the scene. The entire exercise could have been done in the black box, but it was felt that most people participating in the exercise were working in proscenium theatres.

Glen Epperson gave a thumbnail sketch of power, distribution and control He indicated what would happen if any of the group were working in a facility that did not have a permanent lighting control system. He touched upon transformer, main, distribution, dimmer, patch, circuits and control boards.

Bob Bauer of Theatrix, Denver, Colorado, took over and described and diagrammed the most common types of theatrical lighting instruments. His main point was that there were different types of instruments that would give very different lighting effects. He talked about the different lenses, reflectors and lamps that make up each type of instrument. He was able to touch upon just where one might hang each kind of fixture. This segment was of necessity, concise, but it at least let the students know what each lamp looked like and that each had its own specific purpose.

Kerry Comerford then took over and discussed lighting positions, hanging and rigging. Kerry described the whys and wherefores of each hanging position in the proscenium situation. He was able to touch upon the significance of angles and the use of the house boom positions. The counterweight system of the house was shown and Kerry let the group know about hemp and synchronous wench systems. One very important point that Kerry offered was the safety factor. Some of the group had never done any hanging or rigging, so Kerry stressed the importance of considering safety in every step of lighting a show.

Rocky Mountain

After the welcomed rest that Glen, Bob and Kerry gave Scott, Scott took over again with the analysis of the scene that had been performed. The entire group participated in the process of analysis. Scott asked for clues as to the placement, time and mood of the scene. The group came up with a very extensive list including things to suggest the environment and artistic considerations. On the list were: microscopic, romantic, cosmos, nervousness, low-key, one-sided, imbalance. The group thought of colors in terms of warm and cool colors and what the scene wanted. The meaning of the angle from which the light came was an important consider-The group talked about what statement the light would make if it were to go through something to cast shadows. At this point, the group broke for lunch and tried to digest all of what was said and demonstrated.

After lunch, Scott explained floor plans, section drawings, schedule sheets and other graphic materials used in the communication of a light plot. Scott had prepared some drawings of the theatre on a very large scale, so that the entire group could see them. The instrument symbols were cut-outs with spray glue on the back so that he could move them around on the plan. There followed a discussion on the practical applications in giving visibility to what was happening on stage. For this exercise, the group kept to three areas with house booms, beams, first electric, second electric and some cyclorama light. A couple of specials for the bench and fireworks effects were thrown in. With this large scale plot the group was able to see how the lights should be ganged together and what lights should be controlled by which dimmers. The colors were then selected and the hook-up charts were written.

It was now time to hang and focus what the group had designed. For this activity the group was broken up into smaller sections. Six to eight people were assigned to each area: beams, left and right house booms, first electric, second electric, patch panel and control board. Each group of students had at least one of the more experienced technicians working with them. This, by the way, might be a new expedient way to get a show hung and focused ... the "technician-per-instrument" system. Scott directed the focusing of all lights, sometimes doing two and three at a time. When this was all completed, the students sat back in the auditorium and set cues for the scene. It was a very short tech rehearsal -- up-a-pointing and down-a-pointing for awhile, so that everyone could see how things worked.

The two actors, Lisa Banworth-Kuhn and Peter Warren came back and ran the scene in the lighting that had been set. The scene was ran a few times so that the group could make changes. Suggestions were made to the "director" in changes in the blocking so that the students could see the interaction necessary between the director and the designer.

The critique which followed led to some very lively discussion that gave everyone the feeling that they had accomplished what they set out to do. The students saw what happened in lighting

a show from A to Z. They could really see what effect their work had on the scene. The questions, comments and suggestions given by the participants at the end of the session were proof positive that the panel had let them know the processes and had left many questions in their heads that they would like answered. It was the feeling of everyone involved that those questions will be answered because the session offered nudged their curiosity.

RMUSITT held a preliminary meeting in Denver with David Hale Hand, Scott Roth, Pete Happe, Gary Christiansen, Lewis Crickard, Claremarie Verheyen and Tim Kelly, to organize the 1982 USITT Annual National Conference. Initially, the Conference Committee has been set as follows:
