"THE FEARLESS VAMPIRE DRESSERS"

Rather than give COSMAK readers merely excerpts from an intriguing project initiated by San Diego University's costume shop supervisor Kathleen Romero Teague, here's a complete 1985 press release presented to COSMAK to give you the total picture regarding "The Fearless Vampire Dressers". Special thanks to Kathy Romero Teague.

The Learning Resource Center of San Diego State University has for the second time, been honored with a BEST OF WEST award from the Western Educational Society of Telecommunications. WEST is a regional organization representing thirteen western states and two western provinces of Canada which annually sponsor the competition designed to identify and recognize the best examples of local and regional radio and television production. This year the Learning Resource Center was honored for the production of "The Fearless Vampire Dressers."

This tongue-in-cheek look at the duties of a costume crew presents all aspects of the dressers' role from rehearsals through the run of the play. The objective of the program was to familiarize SDSU drama students with running procedures for costume crews, and to give them a sense of what it is like to work backstage.

The Drama Department opens 16 shows per year, training undergraduate students to be crews for each production. According to Kathleen Romero Teague, costume shop supervisor and initiator of the project, the 12 minute program has reduced staff time for the biweekly training session by 50%.

This whimsical spoof of the Dracula myth, written by producer/director Carol Riordan in collaboration with Ms. Teague, was taped at the SDSU Drama Department's 1984 Summer production of "The Passion of Dracula", and edited in the LRC's newly upgraded facilities. "We couldn't have done it without Jay Fields, who directed "Dracula", and was gracious enough to let us take up dress rehearsal time for taping," said Ms. Riordan.

Production efforts were greatly enhanced by local theatre and television professionals James Brown, who provided music and narration, and Adrienne Webb, who gave her services as assistant director and lighting designer.

In addition to the student cast and crew of "The Passion of Dracula" who appeared throughout the program, cast member Jim Morlino, Drama Major Jeudi Brealey, and LRC student assistant Seretta Dickes starred as the fearless vampire dressers. LRC staff Rudy Vaca and Bill Behrens provided camera and video engineering expertise respectively.

"This award recognizes the superior quality of the productions being created by the Learning Resource Center, noted Dr. Richard Gerrero, Executive Producer for the LRC . "Being recognized for excellence by one's peers is truly the greatest form of recognition."

IOD Holds Conference

The Twenty Fourth Annual Outdoor Drama Managers, Directors and Promoters Conference sponsored by the Institute of Outdoor Drama of The University of North Carolina was held October 23, 24 and 25, 1986 at the Holiday Inn in Chapel Hill, North Carolina

Highlights of the conference were panel discussions on ticket sales and fundraising, headed by George Parides, N.C. Theatre Arts, Raleigh; and featured Whitney Jones, president of Whitney Jones Associates, Winston-Salem; and Ray Raillard, executive vice president of Paul Green's "Texas," Canyon, Texas. A panel on travel and business trends which affect outdoor drama was headed by Ewel Cornett, producer of Paul Green's "Trumpet in the Land," Dover, Ohio; featuring Charles Heatherly, former director of the N.C. Division of Travel and Tourism, Raleigh; and Michael Rulison, Datanomics, Raleigh, who discussed market identification through surveys.

William R. Winkler III, producer of Kermit Hunter's "Horn in the West," Boone, North Carolina, headed a panel on publicity and public relations, which featured Betsy Nolan, president of The Betsy Nolan Group, New York City; and Doris Helton, graphic/scenic designer, North Carolina Central University, Durham.

New technical, scenic, computer and lighting equipment were introduced by Dr. Joel E. Rubin, lighting consultant, New York City; Dr. David Weiss, Chairman of the Department of Dramtic Art, University of Virginia, Charlottesville; and Jerry Howe, Custom Computers, Shawnee, Kansas and Atlanta, Georgia.

Bill Hardy, director of Kermit Hunter's "Unto These Hills," Cherokee; Ed Pilkington, director of "Horn in the West," Boone; and Clint Vaught, director of Randolph Umberger's "Strike at the Wind," Pembroke, discussed outdoor drama production. A panel on evolving relationships between state and national government arts agencies featured Mary Regan, director of the N.C. Arts Council, Raleigh; and F.G. Awalt, for 30 years an IBM Corporation executive and a member of the Institute of Outdoor Drama Advisory Council. USITT Tour To PQ '87

Plans are being finalized for the Institute's delegation tour to the 1987 Prague Quadrennial and the Congress of the OISTAT. PQ '87 is the major international exhibition and competition of scenography, costume design and architecture, which has been held in the capital city of Czechoslovakia every four years since 1967.

The USITT Tour will be a 14-day visit to Europe, with stops in London, England; Prague, Czechoslovakia; Budapest, Hungary and Salzburg, Austria. The tour departs New York City on June 3, 1987 and returns on June 17 with a package cost of \$2275.00 (which includes round-trip airfare, transfers, hotel accommodations, breakfasts, dinners+in Prague only, sightseeing, two tickets to London theatre and two tickets to the Salzburg Festival). The price is based on doubleoccupancy and the itinerary and costs are subject to change. The tour enrollment is limited. Arrangements may be made to extend your stay in Europe or to join the tour en route.

Architecture

Peder H. Knudson, AIA and Robert L. Benson, ASTC, principals of Knudson-Benson Associates, have been chosen by the University of Washington Extension Division to teach a new course entitled DESIGNING PLACES FOR PUBLIC ASSEMBLY.

The ten session course, which may be taken for credit, will be taught during the winter quarter on the campus of the University of Washington in Seattle. Classes will be held Tuesday evenings, from 6:30 to 9:30 PM, beginning January 6, 1987. [With a break, we hope. ed.]

The course will study the psychology of people in groups, and the human engineering and technical requirements of assembly spaces, including sightlines and seating plans, lighting, heating and ventilation, acoustics, egress and code requirements.

Building types covered will include theatres, cinemas, audio/visual spaces, lecture halls, meeting rooms and ballrooms.

Costume

The Handbook of Practical Cutting on the Centre Point System (1866), By Louis Devere – is a **men's tailoring book** covering all types of coats, jackets, trousers, breeches, waistcoats, gaiters, overcoats, capes, etc. In addition there are several garments for boys; plus paletots and riding habits for women. Devere claims to have published here the first pattern for Women's Riding Trowsers (these were to be worn under a skirt, of course).

This book is one of the oldest we have seen on men's tailoring and has long been out-of-print. Edward Giles in "The History of the Art in Cutting in England" says that Devere's attention to minute details of tailoring and of fit makes the centre point system rank among the best in tailoring literature.

The work is illustrated with nearly **350 pattern diagrams**, and all of these have been enlarged from the original to make them easier to read and work with.

Introductory notes have been added to explain the slow change of men's fashions during the 1850's, 1860's and 1870's – slow enough to make this work useful for nearly all of the 30 year span: MID-VICTORIAN, U.S. CIVIL WAR, THE EMPIRE OF NAPOLEON III. In a continued effort to⁴ update and evolve the Exam processes to reflect the ever-changing job market, USAA will begin giving Exams three times a year in New York, adding a midwinter and a Fall exam period to accompany the traditional Spring exam. In addition, exams will be given once a year in Los Angeles, Chicago and Miami.

As begun last year, the New York exams are divided into two TRACKS. The TRACK A Exam is geared for those people who are currently working professionally in the various categories of Design and Scenic Art. TRACK A stresses a background of produced work, and eligibility is based on having a **minimum of two years** active employment in the membership category being applied to. The exam consists of an interview and review of a candidate's portfolio, and an evaluation of the candidate's resume and specific references.

The TRACK B is the more traditional exam, geared for relative newcomers to the business who feel they can display the various skills needed to work as a Union member. Students and persons who do not have a minimum of two years active employment in professional theatre, film, video, ballet, opera, industrials, commercials or with professional scenic suppliers are required to take the TRACK B Exam. This exam consists of an interview and portfolio review, plus the completion of a special home project and, in some instances, a practical on-the-spot test of certain skills.
