The USITT Founders' Award for many years of service to the Institute will be presented to **Richard L. Arnold**, former President of USITT, Fellow of the Institute, author of *Scene Technology* and Chairman of Northern Illinois University's theatre arts department.

Additional awards will be presented at the banquet scheduled for the close of the Conference on Saturday evening.

COSTUME COMMISSION

There will be several "extra-specials" at the Twin Cities' Conference dealing with projects of the Costume Commission.

Jan Hyatt, Stu Goldberg and Katherine Goss of Baer Fabrics will have a prototype of the *Fabric Sample Resource Book* to present. The book will contain over 200 swatches of fabrics categorized as to wool, silk, cotton, and linen with about 10 weaves and types of fabric under each weave. Trade names and other common names of the same fabric are included along with a small bibliography. Plans call for a student size book and a studio size with larger samples. We will be able to place our orders for copies at the Conference.

At the last conference, Debra Dutkiewicz volunteered to head up a project to compile information on grants funding sources available to individuals in the costuming field. She has collected a lot of names, addresses and "how to" pointers which she expects to put together as a complete packet of information to report on in Minneapolis.

Leon Brauner has been working on the 4th edition of the Directory of Costume Related Sources and Suppliers which is to come out again this spring. COSMAK'S CORNER

Virtuous Vinegar

The Heinz Company put out its "Vinegar Almanac . . . The natural way to stretch your budget throughout the house." It is an attractive, illustrated booklet of just 15 pages, but it is packed with some great Heinz Distilled White Vinegar ideas.

A few areas covered that a tech theatre person might use follow: Cleaning and unclogging appliances, bottles and drains. Cleaning windows, mirrors, tv screens, windshields and venetian blinds. TCG's Survey Available

America's nonprofit professional theatres have made considerable progress in adjusting to the changing economic and philanthropic climate in the past year, according to *Theatre Facts '86*, the newly released national survey published by Theatre Communications Group.

This edition of *Theatre Facts* covers a five-year span. During this time, both the number of theatres funded and the portion of theatres' expenses covered by ongoing National Endowment for the Arts program support has declined. Although total federal support to sample theatres grew 20.5% in 1986, the increases were entirely due to two special NEA grant programs which distributed over \$1.5 million to 7 of the theatres. Regular NEA support to theatres actually decreased by 3%, causing widespread concern in the field, particularly in light of the uncertain future of the extent of theatre participation in the two special support initiatives (Ongoing Ensembles and Challenge Grants), both of which are currently under review and revision.

As in each of the previous four years, state government funding to theatres – primarily in the form of state arts agency grants – has exceeded federal support, with the 1986 increase of 22.3% the largest yet.

Breslin, Norman, Sontag Commissioned

Actors Theatre of Louisville has announced that three major American writers have been commissioned to write full-length plays for the theatre. The playwrights are **Jimmy Breslin**, **Marsha Norman** and **Susan Sontag**. It is the theatre's intention to produce the works in next season's Human Festival of New American Plays.

Pulitzer Prize-winner **Jimmy Breslin** – sportswriter, columnist, novelist, and news commentator – is best known for his column in the *New York Daily News*. In 1986 Breslin received the Pulitzer Prize for Commentary and journalism's George Polk Award.

Marsha Norman is a Louisville native whose first play, *Getting Out* was produced at ATL in 1978. She was awarded the John Gassner New Playwrights Medallion from Outer Critics Circle and the George Oppenheimer-Newsday Award for that work. She received the 1983 Pulitzer Prize for Drama and the Susan Smith Blackburn Prize for her play '*Night Mother*.

Susan Sontag is a novelist, essayist and filmmaker. Known for her provocative literary and cultural criticism, Sontag's publications include On Photography, Against Interpretation, and Illness As Metaphor. Sontag has been the recipient of numerous grants and honors, including fellowships from the Rockefeller Foundation, the Guggenheim Foundation and the American Association of University Women. She has also been awarded the National Book Critics Circle Award.

Some of the most innovative designs in the performing arts were recognized at the Willoughby Fine Arts Center on April 4th, 1987 during the Spring Design and Technical Theatre conference sponsored by the Ohio Section. The Peggy Ezekiel Awards, named after the long-time Cleveland State University Professor active in theatre education, were recently announced by the Awards committee and an Arts Advisory Panel of Ohio-USITT. The seven finalists were selected from a field of 75 nominees from across the state of Ohio. The Cincinnati Conservatory of Music swept the awards in the categories of Scenery, Costumes and Lighting Designs. Artisan and Technical awards went to the Cincinnati Design Team. The winners were:

- Scene Design Paul Shortt for the opera *Alcina*.
- Costume Design Barbara Kay for the opera Love for Three Oranges.
- Lighting Design Neil Jenkinson for Alcina.
- Technical Direction Steven Waxler for *Alcina*.
- Make-up Lenna Kateva for Love for Three Oranges.

Noted architect **Phillip Johnson** was recognized for his work on the Cleveland Playhouse Complex and Ohio Ballet's Associate Artistic Director, **Thomas Skelton**, was given a career service award for his work in the arts in Ohio.

Cosmak further insight into the Society Donna "found . . . a gold mine of information":

"In its earlier days . . . most Costume Society members worked in the museum area but there has been an increase in theatre people, and for good reason. Newton Collection at UT, Austin

Hundreds of scenery and costume designs created for stage and television by the late James B. Newton, a 1963 drama graduate of The University of Texas at Austin, have been given to his alma mater by his mother and sister.

The noted designer's mother, Mrs. Dorothea Newton of Rockdale, and his sister, Dr. Eleanor Funk of Princteon, N.J., gave his design collection through the UT Austin Drama Department for the Hoblitzelle Theater Arts Library of the Harry Ransom Humanities Research Center, where it is being catalogued and eventually will be on display and available for research.

Mr. Newton had been art director and designer for hundreds of professional concerts featuring stars such as Barbra Streisand, Neil Diamond, Alice Cooper, Ben Vereen and Wayne Newton, among many others.

In addition, Mr. Newton had been active in television, where he designed many sets for game shows and television commercials. He also created stage designs for the MGM Grand Hotel in Las Vegas, Madison Square Garden, Radio City Music Hall and the Seattle Repertory Theater.

Mr. Newton earned a B.F.A. degree in theater design from UT Austin in 1963 and an M.F.A. from Yale in 1967, where he studied under the noted Broadway scene designer Donald Oenslager. An endowed scholarship in design is being established in the UT Drama Department in Mr. Newton's memory.

Before designing professionally on a full-time basis, Mr. Newton taught at California State University, UT Austin (spring 1978) and the University of California at Los Angeles.

The USITT's Fourth Biennial Scenography Exposition, 1986 was dedicated to the memory of James B. Newton.

Mrs. Herbert Kliegl, owner of Kliegl Bros. Universal Electric Stage Lighting Co., Inc., passed away on January 19, 1987. She has been succeeded by her son John H. Kliegl II as owner and President.

Kliegl Bros. is the oldest familyowned business and the pioneer of stage, motion picture and studio lighting in America.

The first two days, August 6 and 7, will focus on fabric modification. Programs will include "The Designer and Dyer/Painter Relationship" with Jeannie Davidson, Resident Costume Designer, Oregon Shakespearean Festival, and Lene Price, Dyer/Painter, also of Oregon Shakespearean Festival; Deborah Dryden (author of Fabric Dyeing and Painting for the Theatre) and fellow designer Robert Morgan on the incorporation of fabric modification into design; "Safety, Equipment, and New Products" with Anne Marie Patterson, President of Cerulean Blue, Ltd.; as well as other programs including dye demonstrations, airbrush techniques, and non-pigment modification techniques.

Circus History Exhibit At The Museum of Our National Heritage

Curiosities and Wonders: Evolution of the Modern American Circus, a new exhibit at the Museum of Our National Heritage in Lexington, Mass., opened on Sunday, March 15, 1987 and will run through August 16. Presented in cooperation with the American Antiquarian Society (AAS) of Worcester, Massachusetts, as part of their 175th anniversary celebration, the exhibition traces the history of the American circus from the late 18th to the mid-19th centuries.

The exhibit is drawn from the Society's department of graphic arts and includes prints, posters, and broadsides. The early woodcuts, engravings, and lithographs on display are the forerunners of the brightlycolored posters that advertise circuses today.

Three types of early traveling enterprises will be featured: the menagerie; equestrian acts and acrobats; and the circus, which combines the earlier entertainments. Other materials on display include newspaper advertisements, periodicals, and books. Circus toys belonging to historian, collector, and Creative Playthings co-founder Bernard Barenholtz will also be shown.
