Be It Known . . . Let It Be Known

At the Summer Board Meeting of the USITT, following a general workshop/retreat, the following resolution was made and passed. The workshop/retreat was convened for the purpose of re-evaluation of the FIVE YEAR PLAN which was passed two years earlier in Toronto, Canada at a like retreat. We are pleased to note that the goals set two years ago, are in majority completed, with some goals of such scope that they are on-going. All but one have been substantially acted on.

What follows is the re-evaluation of the Institute goals for the next two year period and beyond. Passed, August 11, 1987.

THE FOLLOWING LIST REPRESENTS GOALS AND OBJECTIVES FOR USITT WITHIN THE NEXT FIVE YEARS:

- 1) To provide research, publications, exhibitions and representation for technicians, designers, production and stage managers, technical directors, crafts-people, artisans, consultants, engineers, commercial firms, educators, and students working in the live theatrical production industry with a secondary emphasis on those in related fields and media.
- 2) To enhance the image of the Institute to increase the visibility of USITT and to further the growth of the Institute, obtaining outside prospectus by all means possible. Each prospectus shall especially include:
 - a) International Liaison and its interfaces
 - b) Addition of Ex-Officio Board Member(s) from other or allied industry.
 - c) Internal evaluation of our role within the Art and our Art forms within society, and to express those ideas in a public forum.
 - d) Other vehicles towards these ends.
- 3) To review the entire publications area, including the Publications Committee and its policy statement and charge. In specific:
 - a) To advance the mission of the Journal and other publications.
 - b) The re-organization to create a position of a full time Publications Manager/Editor. The search for such person to start immediately.
- 4) To continue the growth and development of the Annual Conference and implement paid staffing of exhibit and registration functions.
 - a) The TIME & PLACE COMMITTEE be renamed the CONFERENCE POLICY COMMITTEE and become the policy-making body for all conferences sponsored by the Institute.
 - b) That the CONFERENCE POLICY COMMITTEE, initiate the hiring of a professional conference manager (on a contract basis) to deal with those aspects of the conference that carry through from year to year. The Committee will solicit a job description for this position from the immediate-past Conference Chairmen, and will solicit bids from qualified professionals. Progress reports to be presented at the Board meeting, December 6th, 1987.
 - c) That at future conferences, there be one category of

- activity called Programming (instead of "Local" or "National" Programming), which will be coordinated by Commissions and facilitated by the local Conference Committee.
- d) That a portion of the surplus funds from each Conference be returned to the Local Section which hosted the Conference.
- 5) Additional functions and personnel shall be added to the National Office to achieve greater efficiency in the operation of the Institute and to free the officers of the Institute of the growing routine tasks of administration so they may devote more attention to their roles in the management of the Institute. Accordingly, the following timetable has been established:
 - a) By October, 1987, a new, full-time position will be added to the office staff to handle bookkeeping, conference registration and clerical services. This action will enable the General Manager to devote more time to conference coordination and fund raising support.
 - b) By the end of September, 1987, it shall be determined if the Institute expects to have the financial support needed to employ a publications editor/manager for all Institute publications.
 - c) By March 1, 1988, a publication editor/manager shall be hired to edit all major publications of the Institute if funds for this position can be assured.
 - d) By March 1989, a full-time position shall be created to include the functions of advertising sales, conference exhibit management and exhibit tour coordinator.
 - e) Annual reviews shall be conducted to determine if it is desirable to hire an Executive Director to supervise the expanded office staff represented in 1-4 above.
- 6) That the President appoint an Ad-Hoc Committee to evaluate the location and organization of the National Office. The final plan to be implemented not later than July 1, 1991.
- 7) To implement the program of developing unearned income for USITT including, but not limited to:
 - a) The prague Quadrienalle, 1987 & 1991
 - b) The continuation and expansion of The Design Exposition.
 - c) To improve the National and International image of the Institute.
 - d) To expand and support the Technical Expositions.
 - e) To expand and support the Architectural Expositions.
 - f) To expand and support National and International Master Classes.
 - g) To expand and support attendance and delegations to cooperative conferences.
 - h) To expand and support special publications.
 - i) To encourage special projects and operations.
 - To contract for professional advice and/or services to realize these objectives as needed, or is advisable.

All of the preceding must be sent to the USITT National Office and must arrive no later than December 1, 1987. Petitions received late, with incomplete documentation, or with invalid signatures can not be considered by the Nominations Committee.

The Restoration Directory: A Listing of Services in the New York City Area was recently revised and published by the N.Y. Landmarks Conservancy. The chapters include; Design Professionals; Restoration Consultants; Stone, Sandstone, Brick and Terra Cotta Masons, Cleaners and Suppliers; Architectural Woodworkers and Refinishers; Roofers; Architectural Metalworkers: Stained Glass Studios: Decorative Finishes Studios and Window Restoration Services. Each listing contains the firm's address, phone, and descriptions of recently completed work as well as information on the size of usual projects, the number of years the firm has been in business, and the firm's client preferences (i.e., public agencies or private homeowners). The listings do not constitute a referral from the Conservancy but serves as a resource.

City Reborn is a new publication that traces the development experiences of four cities that have taken major steps toward redevelopment and economic recovery. The subjects are Boston, Louisville, Pittsburgh, and St. Louis.

The work begins with a chapter on "The Public and Private Development Process." The other chapters, each devoted to one of the cities, includes background information including demographic and labor statistics as well as the strategies each city adopted to spur investment and development. The philosophy behind their efforts to rebuild are also discussed.

There are numerous black-and-white photos of cityscapes and some aerial views. The soft-covered volume measures $8\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" and contains 203 pages, but it has no index, or bibliography. Sources of information are often referred to within the text.

The New Jersey Business Source Book might have included the subtitle "Everything You Ever Wanted To Know About N.J. Business, But Were Afraid To Ask!"

Chapters include: Chambers of Commerce; N.J. Unions; Professional & Trade Associations; Permit & Licensing Requirements; 100 Largest Employers in N.J.; Specialized N.J. Publications; N.J. Economic Development Agencies; Business Services; and Mailing List Information.

While the book does not relate directly to the performing arts and architecture, professionals in our fields can find a use for it. For example, among the specialized publications it lists are Architecture New Jersey, Building Trades Directory (Phila., Atlantic City, N.J.), and Outdoor Recreation Plan. Each entry includes the editor's name, the address of publication, and a brief description. Trade and professional organizations found here are the National Arts Materials Trade Association, the N.J. County Planners Association, and more. In addition, the documentation of N.J. Chambers of Commerce could, undoubtedly, be useful to architects trying to locate development areas.

The book is $8\frac{1}{2}$ " x 11" in soft cover, and the listings are computer generated (the quality for the type of printing, however, is good). The cost is \$59.95.

ANNOUNCEMENT

With effect from August 31, 1987, the League of Professional Theatre Training Programs will dissociate its membership and cease all member activities. Founded in 1972, the League was an alliance of professional theatre training institutions devoted to the identification and support of standards for training. Its purpose was to parallel the development of talent with the development of the not-forprofit professional theatre. Citing a change, four years ago, in the funding policies of the National Endowment for the Arts and recognizing the need to engage a broader constituency in the issues facing talent development for the not-for-profit professional theatre. the League's Board has voted to dissolve the corporation.

Two years ago, acknowledging the necessity for greater interaction between training programs and the not-for-profit professional theatres, the League sponsored a series of meetings of artisitic directors, trainers, and other concerned persons to discuss that issue. Following those discussions, the League formed a national Task Force to focus the issue(s) further and to recommend responses to the problems identified. The membership trusts that the work of the Task Force will be continued and, as a result, the concerns for the development of talent for our theatres will be increasingly and more widely shared in the future.

The League's primary activities were Standards and Membership, Training Information Service, annual publication of the Information Bulletin, National Audition Tour, Actor Presentations, Design Portfolio Review, Teacher Referral Service, Grants Review, Faculty Augmentation, and Guest Director program.

Past and present members of the League have included American Conservatory Theatre, Boston University, Brandeis University, California Institute of the Arts, Carnegie-Mellon University, Goodman School of Drama, The Juilliard School, New York University, North Carolina School of the Arts, Ohio University, Southern Methodist University, SUNY Purchase, Temple University, University of California, San Diego, University of Washington, and the Yale School of Drama.

Business Committee For The Arts Increase Support

Business is expected to increase its support to the arts by 3% this year, over last year, according to a recent national survey conducted by the Business Committee for the Arts. Inc. of its members. The Business Committee for the Arts, the first and only national not-for-profit business organization that advocated business understanding and alliances with the arts, was founded in 1967 by David Rockefeller. Its members are chairmen, presidents and CEO's who head companies with exemplary businessarts programs. Since the BCA was founded, business has invested more than \$5.4 billion in the arts throughout the United States.

The survey revealed that many businesses are becoming increasingly involved in new types of alliances with the arts. For example, there is a new willingness to share sponsorship of arts projects with other businesses. Eighty-seven percent (87%) of the respondents indicated that they would now consider this option. Seventy-eight percent (78%) of the businesses surveyed indicated that they would consider supporting emerging arts organizations and 38% said that they would support risk-taking arts organizations and projects.

Additionally, the survey revealed that more and more businesses are contributing products and services to arts organizations. While most businesses do so as a supplement to the funding they provide, 37% of the respondents indicated that they contributed products in lieu of funds. Many businesses — 53% are also encouraging their employees to volunteer their time to arts projects and organizations that they fund.

COSTUME COMMISSION

Norman Norell Fashions

An exhibition of the creations of the American fashion designer Norman Norell is currently on view in the Costume and Textile Galleries on the fourth floor of the Brooklyn Museum of Art. The exhibition, entitled Norman Norell: Fashion at Mid-Twentieth Century, will run through January 11.

When Norell died in 1972 at the age of 72, he had been dean of American couturiers for thirty years. Noted for their tailoring, his designs alternated between being ultrafeminine, as in his full-skirted ingenue dresses of the mid-1950's, and masculine, as in his shirtwaist and sailor-collar garments. Throughout his career his aim was to dramatize the look of his clients by means of striking simplicity.

Between 1941 and 1960 he was the designing partner of Traina-Norell. In 1960, he went into business under his own name, opening a showroom in the heart of New York's garment district at 550 Seventh Avenue.
