The 1988 National Conference will hold many enticing events for people with costume interests: from the "magic" of Disney to exploring the creative resources of the Right Side of the Brain, along with excursions to the LA County Museum and to Universal Studios. A true California Experience! Of course, there will be Hot Tubs and swimming pools, not that there will be much time for exploring them.

Herb Camburn, coordinator of the Costume Commission Programming, has pulled together rich full days that will certainly satisfy the brain's left and right sides. In addition to panel presentations there are "hands on" sessions in figure drawing and color exploration and a full afternoon at the LACMA complete with a tour of the recently completed Design Research Center. Alas, the Hollywood Costume Exhibit will have come down; however, we will at least get to hear about its development and installation from Curator Edward Meader and Assistant Curator Dale Gluckman. (An added attraction at the Museum is the "David Hockney; A Retrospective" exhibit which we will have some time to see, I hope.) She has done extensive research on Russian beading techniques and has developed new methodology for contemporary use.

IOD Summer Auditions

An early deadline, March 7, has been set for entry in the annual summer theatre auditions sponsored by The Institute of Outdoor Drama. The Institute will hold the annual auditions in Chapel Hill on Saturday, March 19, 1988. Fourteen theatre companies from seven states will convene on the Chapel Hill campus to audition performers and interview technicians looking for summer theatre jobs.

Applicants must be at least eighteen years old and must have had previous theatre training or credit. Singers are asked to prepare two numbers with music. Dancers will be led through warmup, assorted combinations, and across-the-floor routines using ballet, modern, and folk choreography. Actors will perform a one-minute prepared monologue, and may offer another at callback interviews. Technicians' interviews will take place during callbacks.

Final deadline for receipt of applications is Monday, March 7, 1988. To request application materials or further information, send a SASE to Auditions Director, Insitute of Outdoor Drama, 3240 Graham Memorial, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, NC 27599-3240, (telephone: 919-962-1328).

Employment in an outdoor drama requires a 9-12 week commitment, including three weeks of rehearsal and an 8-10 week season. Companies may offer additional productions, experimental theatre and workshops, children's theatre productions and college credit programs. Some of the major companies offer subsidized or paid housing, or will assist in locating housing for company members.

Martha Coigney Elected President of ITI

Meeting recently in Paris, a 16-member Executive Committee unanimously elected Martha W. Coigney President of the International Theatre Institute (ITI). Ms. Coigney succeeds Nobel Laureate Wole Soyinka as the 14th President of the worldwide theatre organization, which has offices in 72 countries.

During her term, Ms. Coigney plans to emphasize the diversity of ITI's constituents, seeing that all the world's cultures continue to inform the work of ITI.

Ms. Coigney is Executive Director of the U.S. Center of ITI and has served the organization for 22 years. She is the second American - and the second woman - elected President in the 40year history of ITI.

The election comes at a time when the U.S. is emerging as an international center for theatre, with prominent festivals such as the Los Angeles Festival, Pepsico Summerfare, Theatre of Nations in Baltimore, and the upcoming New York International Festival, bringing theatre from all over the world to U.S. audiences. Theatres across the country are exchanging directors with foreign theatres and performing more foreign plays than ever before. ITI has spent 40 years planting the seeds and cultivating international theatre. Now the efforts

are bearing fruit. "I believe adding an international dimension to American theatre presents us with a tremendous opportunity, not only to increase artisitic awareness here, but to uncover an entirely new audience abroad." emphasized Coigney.

ITI celebrates its fortieth anniversary in 1988. The organization was formed in Paris in 1948 by a group of theatre leaders including Rosamond Gilder, J.B. Priestley, Jean-Louis Barrault, and Julian Huxley, the first Director General of UNESCO. They decided that theatre professionals should have their own means of communication, outside the government channels. The International Theatre Institution links the theatres of all nations through a network of 72 "Foreign Embassies" for theatre professionals.

ITI serves theatre by:

- Providing information, contacts and expertise to theatre professionals who wish to add an international dimension to their work;
- Consulting on festivals, conferences and international collaborations;
- Sending theatre people to explore the theatre abroad;
- Maintaining libraries documenting contemporary theatre;
- Ensuring that theatre from all over the world is represented at international forums.

Women Spotlighted

The Theatre Library Association announces the publication of Volume XII of its *Performing Arts Resources* series. The cloth-bound book highlights aspects of American society as seen through plays and popular entertainments. Noted scholars contributed topical play lists and bibliographies of scripts, books and manuscripts that focus on children, women, the Civil War, female impersonation, and 1930's labor activism to this volume of almost 200 pages, edited by Barbara Cohen-Stratyner.

Performing Arts Resources, Volume XII, contains the following valuable additions to the curatorial literature: A Preliminary Checklist of Children's Plays, 1780-1855 by Jonathan Levy and Martha Mahard; a Bibliography of 19th century sources on 19th century women by Noreen C. Barnes and Laurie J. Wolfe; a Checklist of American Civil War Drama by Rosemary L. Cullen; a Bibliography of Performed Materials on Female Impersonation by Geraldine Maschio; and an Annotated Bibliography of Labor Plays by Colette A. Hyman.
