Kudos to our "Webmeister" Normand Bouchard. His hard work on the USITT Homepage (http://www.ffa. ucalgary.ca/usitt) has attracted the attention of a "cybercritic" who gives us a big thumbs up.

Point Communications Corporation (http://www.pointcom.com) has a mission to evaluate and rate worldwide web sites: "We provide surfers with a standard of excellence: a catalog of the most lively, useful, and fun sites on the Net." Their rating system looks at "content," "presentation," and "experience" and according to their evaluation, the USITT Homepage ranks among the top 5% web sites world-wide. (Least we get too cocky, remember that web sites world-wide these days number in the hundreds of thousands, so the top 5% is still a pretty big group.)

Here's Point's rating and review of our homepage:

"United States Institute for Theatrical [sic] Technology Content: 35 points Presentation: 30 points Experience: 34 points [on a scale of 50 points] "Informational site for theater pro-

duction people, mainly concerned with the doings of the "institute" itself. More or less an on-line brochure, this site gives a good overview of USITT's offerings and services. Everything you need to know about the group's 1996 convention and expo is on-line. Students will want to save the list of available grants and awards. This is a good site to check out if you hope to make your living off set design, lighting, or some other technical aspect of staging plays.

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"Review category: Theater & Dance.

The folks at Point describe their rating system thus, "if scores could

talk, this is what they'd sound like:

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- 40-49 The singing of angels
- 30-39 The singing of Caruso
- 20-29 The singing of Whitney Houston
- 10-19 The singing of William Shatner
- 0-9 The singing of Marcel Marceau"

Their description of each category provides a little more information about their evaluation criteria:

# RUBIN STEPS DOWN

I have regrettably received the resignation of Dr. Joel E. Rubin, as Chair of the OISTAT Steering Committee and Chair of the International Liaison Committee for USITT. As in any volunteer organization, people come and go, with the vagaries of the "paid" jobs we all have to do, and the incredible time commitment required for the core volunteers of USITT. Most often, we just thank the individual as they leave office and wish them well. With Joel, given the incredible length of his service to USITT and its international efforts, I think it's appropriate for the membership to see the following note Joel sent along with the resignation, in order to understand and appreciate his contribution to USITT and international cooperation in theatre design and technology.

"It has been a great run for ne...well over thirty-five years ago, Tom DeGaetani and I put together a first international delegation pre-USITT, while simultaneously planning the initial conference of USITT.

"Since my own USITT Presidency, I have conducted USITT's international activities under fourteen subsequent administrations. I am extremely proud of our accomplishments. I have had a lot of help from a lot of people along the way; I take substantial credit for the vision that has kept us driving into the future. 'International' is no longer a sufficient description; we are 'global' in our outlook and our activities. During my tenure our group:

- helped form an autonomous UNESCO-related international organization, the OISTAT;
- instigated master classes with distinguished international guests;
- placed scores of international guests as visiting lecturers in our USITT regions and on members' campuses;
- ) prepared United States exhibits for the Prague Quadrennial (some winners as well);
- provided an important international guest presence at USITT Confer-

ences. Many scores of guests from over forty countries have now shared with us at our conferences and many of them have subsequently hosted USITT members traveling abroad on U.S. Center introductory letters. In parallel, we have provided continuing programs which progressively paid attention to socialist countries, then Pacific Rim nations, and now the Latin American countries;

- implemented the regular participation of USITT professional delegations in the OISTAT Congresses and Commission meetings as well as other important international conferences within USITT disciplines;
- sustained the ongoing funding efforts that paid for a very large portion of these activities.

"This is a catalog of accomplishments. These activities, one might advocate, have enhanced the value of the Institute to each and every member. I have had a marvelously great time in growing the USITT global presence and treasure the accomplishments and friendships formed in this work."

And once you have found what you want to do, use the Dallas-Fort Worth Metro Maps (http://www.utdallas.edu/DFW/dfwmaps.html) to find how to get there.

If you are interested in costume research, the Vintage Clothing home page (http://www.cs.brown.edu/people/ smh/vintage/vintage.html) has information on how you can be added to their e-mailing list. If you are planning on a Renaissance festival, the Medieval and Renaissance Wedding Information (http://paul.spu.edu/ %7Ekst/bib/bib.html) site will be helpful. The Drama Publishers Catalog `₩ttp://www.users.interport.net/ /dramapub/little.html) lists costume books which they publish. There is an interesting site on the costumes for the film Braveheart, which were designed by Charles Knode (http://www. foresight.co.uk/braveheart/ brcostume.html).

## THEATER DESIGNERS' HOME PAGES

We will see more and more theatre designers and technicians using the Web to display their work. Creating a home page allows these people to include renderings and photos of productions. They also include biographical material and other important information. I have created my own home page (http://www.siue.edu/~csweeze/) to show what might be included in such a site. Mark Reaney (http:// kuhttp.cc.ukans.edu/~mreaney/ reaney.html) also has an excellent home page. This is in addition to his "VR On-State Home Page" (http:// \kanaix.cc.ukans.edu:80/~mreaney) hich was listed in last month's "WOW!" article. Adam Watkins (http:// cc.usu.edu/~slg8n/designs.html) includes designs from his production of Cat on a Hot Tin Roof in his home

page, and Herrick Goldman (http:// www.mit.edu:8001//people/herrick/) is a theatre lighting designer who includes examples of his work. Leslie Elledge's home page (http://web.sbtcorp.com/ car54/leslie.html) takes a different approach in displaying her interests.

# POSTER SESSION PROPOSED FOR PITTSBURGH

A relatively new format for conference seminars, called a poster session, is gaining popularity at national conferences put on by such organizations as American Chemical Society and The Costume Society of America. Betty Blyholder of the University of Arkansas has proposed such a poster session be included in the Costume Commission's programming for the Pittsburgh Conference & Stage Expo in 1997.

The purpose of a poster session is to exchange information—normally research is presented orally.
