Theatre District Offers Endless Variety of Theatres

As if we hadn't already given you enough reasons (and enough theatres) for visiting Minneapolis this spring for the 2003 Annual Conference & Stage Expo, we proudly present REASON #226: The Hennepin Avenue Theatre District. The area is filled with patrons going to the theatre, enjoying a fabulous eatery before or after the show, or finding a delectable after-hours place for dessert or a cocktail. The Hennepin Avenue Theatre District is a natural gathering place for lovers of all kinds of theatre.

Located in downtown Minneapolis, the Hennepin Avenue Theatre District follows Hennepin Avenue between Fifth and Tenth streets. Historically, Hennepin Avenue has been the site of countless cultural celebrations, parades, and gatherings — the place where the city comes together, making its designation as an arts and cultural district even more appropriate. And its location just five short blocks from the Convention Center, Hilton, and Hyatt Regency makes exploring the area on your own or with a tour very easy.

While many of the great buildings of the past have been torn down (theatres with names such as Radio City, Seventh Street, Gopher, Palace, and Strand), Minnesotans are thankful for the historic jewels that have remained and been polished to a new luster on Hennepin Avenue. Other historic buildings have been reincarnated as theatres. One was a paint store and another was a Masonic Temple.

There are currently six theatre venues that comprise the Hennepin Avenue Theatre District. Whatever type of show you are looking for, it can likely be found here. From Broadway musicals and off-Broadway interactive shows to national music acts, first-rate comedians and comedy reviews, as well as original works and festivals, Hennepin offers it all.

Hennepin Center for the Arts

Built in 1890 as the Masonic Temple, the Hennepin Center for the Arts houses performance spaces and the offices of many local arts organizations. The eighth floor space is the home of Illusion Theater. Since its inception in 1974, Illusion Theater has commissioned or developed over 250 original mainstage plays. Subsequently, plays developed at Illusion through residencies and their Fresh Ink new play series have been staged by more than 100 theatres across the United States, including major regional theatres such as the Mark Taper Forum in Los Angeles, the Alliance Theatre in Atlanta, the Goodman Theatre in Chicago, and the Manhattan Theatre Club.

Two of the plays developed at Illusion (*Miss Evers' Boys* and *The Velocity of Gary*) have been made into motion pictures and several have been published. It is important to note that *Miss Evers' Boys* went on to receive three Emmy awards as an original HBO film and was also the runner-up for the 1992 Pulitzer Prize for Drama. In addition, with Producing Director Bonnie Morris' guidance, a national symposium was arranged to address the legacy of the Tuskegee Study. This eventually led to President Clinton's public apology to its survivors and their descendents.

Hey City Theater

Hey City Theater produces long-running off-Broadway musicals and comedies in an inviting atmosphere. Its production history includes such hits as *Tony & Tina's Wedding*, *Smokey Joe's Café*, *Nunsense*, *AMEN*, and *The Rocky Horror Show*. The dinner/cabaret

theatre style approach has been demonstrated in a variety of ways in tandem with their unique venue. For instance, within their two story space, *Tony & Tina's Wedding* starts with a wedding ceremony in the "chapel" space upstairs, then guests move downstairs to the "banquet hall" for the reception. (By the way, Hey City was the space "originally" known to audiences as a paint and wallpaper shop!)

Historic State Theatre



The Historic State Theatre, an Italian Renaissance-style theatre, was built in 1921 as a silent movie and vaudeville house. It was restored to its original splendor in 1991, and now

hosts stage and Broadway shows, concerts, corporate meetings, and special events. (Note: HGA and Associates architectural firm was responsible for the renovation work on the State, Orpheum, and Pantages theatres. Join the Architecture Commission and Regional programmers for a joint program and tour on Thursday, March 20 of all three of these theatre spaces by signing up for MINNEAPOLIS THEATRE DISTRICT TOUR. Historic Orpheum Theatre

The Historic Orpheum Theatre was built in 1921 as a silent movie and vaudeville house. Considered the largest vaudeville house west of New

York City for many Orpheum Theatre

years, it was renovated in 1993 and has showcased the world premieres of *Victor/ Victoria* starring Julie Andrews, and Disney's *The Lion King*. The expanded Orpheum stage was recently enlarged in order to accommodate epic Broadway shows, concerts, and plays.

Pantages Theatre (Mann)

Currently closed, the space was built in 1916 and operated as the Pantages Theatre where it housed vaudeville performances during the 1910s and 1920s. It operated as the RKO Pan in 1946, when it started featuring movies. In 1961, it became the Mann Theatre where it continued to show movies, including the sneak preview screenings of *The Sound Of Music* (which played for nearly two years) and *West Side Story*. Restoration of the Pantages as a live performance space is currently underway. It is slated to open in Winter 2002/2003.

Shubert Theater

Currently closed, the space was built in 1910 as the Shubert Theater, the oldest theatre in Minneapolis still standing. It features a Classical Revival style with terra cotta facade. It became a vaudeville and burlesque house known as the Alvin Theatre in 1934 and operated as a movie theatre (the Academy) beginning in 1957. It recently traveled from its original location on Block E to its current home on Hennepin Avenue. Plans are underway for restoration. The Minnesota Shubert project was born in 1998 when Artspace (a nonprofit corporation that restores spaces for artists to perform and live in) accepted the challenge of moving and renovating the historic Shubert Theater. The relocation of the Shubert was one for the record books, as it was the heaviest building ever moved on rubber wheels.

Once the six-month relocation was completed, Artspace began the capital campaign process. The Minnesota Shubert Performing Arts and Education Center will play a vital role in the renaissance of downtown Minneapolis' Hennepin Avenue Theatre District by adding an important cultural destination in a central location. The \$30 million project will include a new stage house and a complete renovation of the theatre, construction of an atrium building connecting the Shubert with the neighboring Hennepin Center for the Arts, and modifications to Hennepin Center.

So, can you say activity? And if Broadway (that other Great White Way) considers Minneapolis the place to premiere its latest tours and projects, why shouldn't you? Come for the conference stay for the theatre! Make it a REAL GREAT WHITE WAY experience you'll remember for years to come. NOTE: At the time of printing, spring line-ups had not been announced. Presidential Update: **October Board Sessions**

The USITT Board of Directors gathered in Las Vegas October 18 and 19 for our annual fall Board of Directors meeting, and while it might sound glamorous at first glance, the agenda was filled with extensive meetings and we were able to do a lot of good work for the Institute.

Toronto in 2005

Board action confirmed that the 45th Annual Conference & Stage Expo will be held in Toronto in 2005. This will be a wonderful venue for all of the plans we have put in place for 2005. Toronto a is wonderful international city and will serve as the perfect backdrop for the World Stage Design Exhibition and the OISTAT World Congress — activities which you will be hearing much more about in the coming months. Our colleagues at the Canadian Institute for Theatre Technology (CITT) are again graciously extending the hospitality of the city, and Vice-President for Conferences John Uthoff reports that his conversations with the Toronto Convention Center and nearby hotels seem very cordial.

Finance Update

James Bandoblu, CPA and longtime accountant for USITT, joined us for the first time to share his expertise and to help make the officers and Board members better informed about the financial workings of USITT and to address some much needed financial policy changes. Mr. Bandoblu attended meetings of the Executive Committee, the Finance Committee, and the Board of Directors. At these meetings, he reviewed the Institute's certified audit, and explained the current financial position of the organization. During his presentation he also discussed the importance of USITT developing a financial plan for the next five years. I also presented projections showing that income and expenses are currently in balance, but future projections show that we need to pay close attention and develop or enhance revenue to continue our financial health. At the same time, we need to be very aware of preserving our current fund balance by judicious spending.

Board Retreat

The Friday evening board retreat concentrated on developing new marketing initiatives for membership, conference, and Stage Expo. The board broke into small groups with each group concentrating on a specific area. These groups will continue to develop ideas and strategies and will unveil a new marketing plan for the institute at the March 2003 board meetings. I personally wish to thank each of the participants in these sessions because they have made and are continuing to make an

Sapsis Rigging was instrumental in bringing the concept of fashion shows in rep to the library in 1992 and has been involved in every season since then. Another Sapsis, Bill, conducted safety education sessions for the Juilliard School of Music, and the New York, Boston, and Chicago staffs of Blue Man Group.

Prague Quadrennial 2003 Progress Report

Three exhibits are being planned for the United States entries in the Prague Quadrennial 2003. The National Exhibit is being designed by Robert Schmidt and Ursula Belden and built by Robert Scales, and Duncan Mahoney, and a team of students at University of Southern California. In addition to this team. Laura Crow, Arden Weaver, Rick Thomas, Margaret Mitchell, and Sandy Bonds are serving as curators. Sixty productions have been selected for inclusion in the exhibit, with a focus on the collaboration of a team of designers. The exhibit will feature a combination of set. costume, lighting and/or sound design for many of the productions. The productions were selected for their innovative and provocative approaches to design and will be represented through renderings, models, costumes, sound, and virtual displays. Productions selected represent a cross section from American theatre from coast to coast and university through professional theatres.

The Schools of Scenography Exhibit will feature 31 universities from around the nation. The students from each participating school will design a mini-exhibit to fit

2003 PQ Tour Planned

USITT is pleased to announce that the planning and organization is complete for the tour in conjunction with the Prague Quadrennial 2003. USITT Past President Dick Durst will lead the tour, which will include 22 days in Eastern Europe, including the Czech Republic, Hungary, and Romania.

"We will have five days in Prague including the opening ceremonies of the 2003 PQ, before leaving there for the rest of the tour," Mr. Durst says. "I think this tour will provide a great blend of theatre contacts, performances, and spectacular tourist areas, but will also include some smaller towns and villages that are not on the typical tourist itinerary. We'll also include plenty of free time for your own exploration!"

After the PQ opening, the group will move to Budapest and its beautiful architecture, theatres, and opera, then to the wine country of northeast Hungary steeped in centuries of cultural traditions. The tour will cross the border into Romania and meander through the Carpathian Mountains of Transylvania and end in Bucharest.

Mr. Durst suggests, "We will visit many of the great cultural centers of the three countries, including museums, theatres, and operas, but we're also including some time inside a standard size trunk. The trunks will form the structure of the exhibit with each of the mini-exhibits on view inside them. The participating schools will nominate one of their student exhibit designers as their representative. Three outstanding trunks will be selected and the designated representatives will be each receive an award of a \$2000 scholarship to attend PQ 2003 and participate in the activities organized especially for students. The scholarships have been funded by the Tobin Foundation of San Antonio, Texas. Tim Saternow is chairing the Schools of Scenography Exhibit.

The Architecture Exhibit, organized by Michael Tingley, will feature theatre architecture designs from recent Architecture Awards competitions. Because of increased interest in the Architecture Exhibit, the PQ organizers are designating a separate exhibit space to accommodate the additional displays.

A special tour, which will include PQ and other destinations in Eastern Europe, is described below. PQ 2003 opens on June 12, 2003 and continues through June 29.

to meet with the people who do productions. This tour reflects my own bias, probably, in that we'll include areas outside the typical tourist venues. We'll see Romanian wooden churches and beautiful painted monasteries, visit a gypsy community (very few people get this opportunity), and, of course, we'll do Dracula's castle." The tour will include airfare from JFK airport in New York, all lodging, many meals, travel in Europe, a guided tour of each major city, and a theatre guide who will be with the group.

USITT President Bruce Brockman was a participant on each of the last two PQ tours and comments: "I can say without question, that these two tours were the most memorable trips of my life. No one should pass up the opportunity to experience our international theatre community this way."

The tour managers Mr. Durst has selected specialize in Eastern European arts tours. The cost will be about \$3325, double occupancy, for the 22 day tour and includes entry fees and most theatre performances, as well as the inclusions listed above. Report on the OISTAT Meetings In Belgrade, Yugoslavia

During the week of September 23rd, YUSTAT - the Yugoslavian OISTAT Centre, hosted the business meetings of OISTAT's Publications and Communications Commission and Governing Board. The YUSTAT Centre's hospitality and Belgrade's pleasant weather helped provide the international participants with fruitful meetings and a better understanding of this vital and rich culture. Meetings were held in several locations: the YUSTAT office, the British Council's new electronic classroom, and the Rector's conference room at the University of Fine (and applied) Arts - all in the center of Belgrade.

The Publications and Communications Commission (PCC) was led by interim Chairperson, Jerome Maeckelbergh of Antwerp, Belgium. There were representatives from China, Netherlands, Russia, Bulgaria, Hungary, Canada, Taiwan, Sweden, United States, Yugoslavia, and Korea participating in the three meetings. The OISTAT PCC is not only responsible for disseminating information about the organization and its activities, but it is also works with the other Commissions to help develop new projects. The PCC also discussed new ways to identify and funnel information on OISTAT Commission activities to the Centres and other interested professionals. Commission-based web site working groups were charged with the responsibility of communicating project and activity information to the PCC and web master. In addition, a new home page index of OISTAT activities was proposed and is now scheduled for implementation.

The PCC also proposed the development of a new electronic edition of *Theatre Words* and since several editions of *Theatre Words* may go out of print sometime in the next few years, it was also recommended that the PCC begin the process of review and revision of the print versions. For several years the PCC has been interested in the development of a theatre database which would benefit professionals in many different countries. *Theatre Atlas*, a project of theatre plans and specifications begun by the Dutch Centre, was identified as a good pilot for this OISTAT web project.

The PCC also asked its members to provide the USITT World Stage Design project with vital and appropriate promotion through their own Centres. The PCC members were pleased with, and very supportive of, this exciting new USITT initiative. There was strong praise for Eric Fielding and his leadership of the project. The next PCC meeting will be in Prague, Czech Republic, in June 2003 (at the time and place of the PQ 03).

Governing Board Meetings - The OISTAT GB was formed at the 2001 Berlin OISTAT World Congress. It is made up of the elected Executive Committee members and the Chairs of each of the Commissions. There are currently 10 nations represented on the 14-member GB. Since the Berlin meeting, the major topic of discussion has been how OISTAT might better serve the working professionals in the theatre. Two of the most significant topics discussed during the two days of meetings were the decision to accept membership applications from individual members who reside in countries in which there is not OISTAT centre and the decision to allow multiple OISTAT Centres in countries where the single centre does not represent all of the constituencies which fall within the umbrella of OISTAT.

The Belgrade GB meeting opened on a sad note as Josef Svoboda and Dr. Ota Ornest, founding OISTAT members and gifted theatre artists were remembered. Their passing has left a great void in the theatre world.

The scheduling of upcoming Commission chairperson elections set Scenography election for 2002, Architecture, History and Theory, and PCC for 2003, and Technology and Education Commission in for 2004. Currently, Michael Ramsaur is chair of the Education Commission, Rick Thomas heads the Sound Working Group, and Laura Crow the Costume Working Group (both working groups operate within the Scenography Commission). USITT President Bruce Brockman, in consultation with the USITT Commissions, appoints USITT voting representatives to OISTAT Commissions. I serve as the head of the US OISTAT Centre and act as USITT's official voting representative. I currently serve as secretary of the OISTAT Executive Committee and Governing Board.

Like most asociations, OISTAT is trying to find better ways to make use of its web site. The new idex should help potential members learn more about the many important activities with which OISTAT is involved. The GB also gave the go-ahead to migrate the OISTAT web site to www.oistat.org. Invitations to host future meetings were approved for the Technology Commission (TC) at DDHG (Germany) in May 2003 and BAST (Belgium) in 2004, with the World Congress at USITT in 2005. In addition, there are PCC, Governing Board, and Executive Committee meetings planned for Prague in June 2003. There are also tentative invitations to hold meetings of the Executive Committee in Canada next fall, and in either Warsaw, Poland, or Taipei, Taiwan, in the fall of 2004 As the meetings wound down, Simona Rybakova (Czech Republic) gave an update on the recent flooding and the resulting catastrophic damage to Czech Theatres.

He has been a champion of and has facilitated a high priority for USITT support of students wishing to explore the worldwide theatre design and technology scene. Officer Profile: Elizabeth Lewandowski

While Elizabeth Lewandowski may be the youngest person on USITT's Executive Committee, her accomplishments and interests give her the proverbial "experience beyond her years." As an honored Regional Section officer, esteemed colleague, Secretary of the Institute, or crafter of infant apparel, Ms. Lewandowski always seems to have a project or two, or three, "in the works."

A professor of theatre at Midwestern State University, in Witchita Falls, Texas, Ms. Lewandowski, teaches primarily costume design and technology and makeup design and technology. She has found the higher education catchphrase that "success is punished" means she serves on several university committees. That includes one that is currently completing a revision to the university's approach to rank and tenure, including both policy and guidelines. That work grew, in part, from her involvement with helping to create USITT's recently-revised *Tenure and Promotion Guidelines*.

Her work as Secretary grew from her desire to give back some of what USITT had done for her. She first became a member while at Texas Tech studying for her master's degree. It was then that Forrest Newlin said "this is something you really need to do." At conferences, friends would tell her about "don't miss" sessions and she enjoyed the extended networking of being part of the organization, going to the banquet, and meeting more people.

"Conferences are not just the information we get, but also the people we get to know" she says. As a Regional Section officer, she participated in the Nominating Committee process and ran for a Director

at Large seat unsuccessfully before then-Secretary Jean Montgomery asked if she would be interested in the Secretary position she was vacating. "I had gained so much from USITT, I felt I should give back." Now, after six years, she is stepping down as secretary to focus on other areas professionally and within USITT. "Some offices benefit from long-time people, but turnover is a healthy thing, and provides new, fresh ideas."

Ms. Lewandowski has already earned kudos for her work with the Southwest Regional Section. She received the Glenn Martin Jr. Service Award in 1992, followed by the 1998 Founders Award for outstanding lifetime service, and the President's Commendation Award. The last award was created and presented in 1999 for "unstinting service as a most instrumental and longstanding board member in this century." What other words might there be to describe that level of effort?

As a designer, Ms. Lewandowski's work was displayed at the Irving Arts Center in "Elizabeth Lewandowski - Costumes A to

The OISTAT GB discussed methods that might enable it and its member Centres to help support the relief effort. USITT is currently fund raising and will forward its member contributions to the relief centre in Prague. Ms Rybakova also noted that several European theatres have developed sister/brother relationships with particular Czech theatres. In addition to funds, the European theatres are providing equipment and supplies (mostly older and/or unused equipment) to the Czech theatre community.

Maija Pekkanen, OISTAT's president, and the GB extended its sincere thanks to Mr. Ramsaur and the OISTAT Education Commission for its exciting new project -Summer Scenofest 2003. This is an excellent example of how USITT offers vital leadership and is deeply involved in international cooperative programs.

OISTAT and the GB voted to support and cosponsor with USITT and CITT the 2005 World Congress and World Stage Design exhibition, which will be held at the USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Toronto. The Governing Board of OISTAT voiced its enthusiastic support of a second world stage design exhibition and believes it will lead the way to enabling other Centres to mount similar exhibitions in the PQ "off years."

OISTAT Secretary and USITT OISTAT Representative Z." Her book, *The Compleate Costume Dictionary* is itself complete, all 2,000 pages of it. It is in the editing stage, and is expected out late next spring.

When not assisting USITT, teaching, writing, or designing, Ms. Lewandowski uses her skills for what she describes as charity sewing - everything from crafting elaborate burial gowns for infants of one and a half pounds to full term, to bibs, sleepers, comforters and blankets, "You don't plan on a child dying, it is important to have one special memory, and it is horrible for people to make money selling them these gowns." She donates her work to hospitals near where she or family members live, as another way of "giving back." If the material is already cut, she can put together booties and matching mitts in about five minutes, and will spend a few minutes before breakfast putting together 15 or so bibs. It's something rewarding to do and creating infant's clothing or blankets for indigent families is one further way to "give back." Sewing, knitting, or crocheting, even making doll clothes is "something to do when your brain is too tired, after a 15 hour day, and you need something to keep your hands busy."

Ms. Lewandowski has been married to her best friend, Dan, for 17 years. They recently survived home renovations together, which she notes is a test for any relationship. While they are child-free, she says having 40 or 50 theatre majors and an open door, open phone policy keeps her quite well supplied with "family," as does being a doting aunt to a slew of nieces and nephews.

Being part of the strong, small, select program at Midwestern suits her very well. Since she is guided by the rule that kindness to other people is overwhelmingly important, she can stay connected and feel she is training the whole student. "If somebody is cranky, there's probably a good reason for it, and kindness goes a long way," she notes.

Kindness is also reflected in her approach to volunteering, where people donate hundreds of hours a year to an organization such as USITT. "I believe everybody's doing the best they can, and while maybe there are many different ways to do a task, approaching any suggested change with kindness is most beneficial."

For Ms. Lewandowski, that kindness translates into assistance and friendship with hundreds of people throughout her personal and professional life. "We have two hands - one of them is to take and the other is to give. At times you have to take, but at other times...."

Survey of Costume Programs Receives a New Look

It is time once again to update the information in the Survey of Costume Programs in the United States. This year, when you log on to the Survey to check your information, you will be surprised by its new look. In the past year the database has received an overhaul by software designer, Gordon J. Ferguson. The basic information is the same, but the site has a fresher look.

USITT's Costume Design & Technology Commission began sponsoring the Survey of Costume Programs in 1995. Its purpose was to compile basic information gathered from a poll of colleges and university costume programs for use as a resource for students who were looking for programs for advanced study.

The Publications Committee of USITT recommended that the Survey appear on the organization's web site as an electronic publication. The venue serves the Survey well because it allows for easy revision. The Survey was first published in 1996 and the initial thrust was for graduate programs, but the response from the undergraduate schools was so strong, the Survey was expanded to include them the following year. There are now 148 schools represented in the Survey, which can be found at www.usitt.org. Click on Commissions in the upper left corner and choose Costume Design & Technology Commission. The link for the Survey appears directly under the title.

On the title page of the Survey you will find a link to articles on "Choosing a Graduate School" and "How To" instructions for using the Survey. There is also a blank "Questionnaire" that may be filled out to electronically submit a revision or to add your school to the Survey.

The Survey Index is organized by regions of the country. Within each region, schools are listed by state. The school has provided information including: degrees offered, faculty and staff in the costume design and technology area; the strengths and areas of concentration, for example, patternmaking, design, wigs and hair, or construction; contact information with address and phone. If e-mail information has been given, the dialog box allows you to send a message within the Survey. If schools have provided web sites, these are also linked from the Survey. The biggest change in the Survey since its conception has been the increase of e-mail addresses and number of web sites.

The Survey is edited once a year in the spring, and a notation appears indicating the last time the Survey entry was revised. Obviously, the information contained in the Survey is helpful only if it is recent. Last year over 70 percent of the Survey was revised.

Because the Survey impartially reports the information given in the questionnaire, it is an excellent resource for high school students looking for an undergraduate program, for the undergraduate looking for a graduate program, and for the faculty advisor. The information provided is enough to let the student narrow their search, and the student can then filter and access the information.

If your program is not represented by the Survey, you are urged to send your information. Those already represented will receive a gentle reminder in the form of an e-mail or letter in January, but, there is no need to wait! Please check your information and e-mail revisions to jadamson@email.unc.edu or use the online blank to send new information. If all the information is correct, please verify that fact so that the date of the last revision will be reflected in the entry.

Set aside a time to investigate this resource provided by USITT. I'm sure you will enjoy the changes.

USITT Members Asked to Participate As ESTA Certification Study Continues

ESTA (the Entertainment Services and Technology Association) is continuing its industry-wide feasibility study on personnel certification with a second survey to run November 21 through December 13. Personnel certification is the voluntary demonstration and recognition of knowledge, skills, and abilities in a given field. ESTA launched a three part feasibility study in September. The first phase, an online survey, targeted a small but crucial sampling of individuals in all areas of entertainment technology, from seasoned veterans to college students, to employers and educators. Over 1,000 responses provided invaluable information to use in the second and third phases of the study. Phase 2 consisted of two focus groups conducted in Las Vegas just prior to LDI 2002 led by Mike Hamm, one of the leading experts in the field of certification.

Now ESTA is asking USITT members to participate in Phase 3 by giving opinions about the need for and value of a certification program for industry technicians. ESTA has stressed it is vitally important to hear from everyone in the industry who could be affected by a certification program and from everyone who might wish to be involved in its development. ESTA expresses its appreciation to those who took part in the first survey and we encourage you to continue your input by participating in this next survey.

Developing a high quality, industry supported certification program is a major undertaking for ESTA, requiring a significant commitment of volunteer time and association resources.
