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
Conference to Honor Lou Bellamy and the Penumbra Theatre

The founder and artistic director of one of North America's pre-eminent African-American theatre companies, Lou Bellamy, will deliver the Keynote to start USITT's 43rd Annual Conference & Stage Expo. Mr. Bellamy and the Penumbra Theatre will also be honored with the Thomas DeGaetani Award, given to honor a lifetime contribution to the performing arts community in a particular region of the country.

Mr. Bellamy, in his artistic director's statement for the Penumbra Theatre Company's current season, notes that "Over the past 25 years, Penumbra's raison d'etre, producing artistically excellent, thought provoking, well appointed productions that probe the human condition with stories told from an African-American perspective, has been constantly refined and refocused." The theatre is celebrating its 25th anniversary with a season-long run of works by August Wilson, who received his professional playwriting debut at Penumbra and who is a long-time company member and board advisor of Penumbra.

Penumbra is the premiere African-American theatre in the United States, and the oldest professional theatre company in St. Paul, Minnesota. It is recognized for its development of educational and outreach programs as well as its contributions to the development of creative talent for the theatre.

Mr. Bellamy, a graduate of Minnesota State University in Mankato, received his master of fine arts from the University of Minnesota. He has been a faculty member at the University of Minnesota for 26 years

and is currently an associate professor. Mr. Bellamy has received numerous awards for excellence in arts and education as well as a doctorate from Hamline University. Among his extensive directing credits are *Someplace Soft to Fall, A Lovesong for Miss Lydia*, and *Soul Alley*. His acting credits include leading roles in *Fences, The Piano Lesson*, and *Talking Bones*. This season he is directing *Two Trains Running*.

The Keynote will be held at 10 a.m. Wednesday, March 19 in the Minneapolis Convention Center Ballroom A to start the 43rd Annual Conference & Stage Expo.

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Heart of the Beast Puppet and Mask Theatre Shows Richness of Minnesota Puppet Genre

As the 2003 USITT Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Minneapolis fast approaches, it struck me that many wonderful themes are starting to emerge — appropriately reflecting the flavor and uniqueness of our theatre community.

Along with some of the flagship theatres we have explored through this series, like the Guthrie and Children's Theatre Companies, as well as the distinctive and diverse Hennepin Avenue Theatre District, the performance area involving puppetry will be a topic of sessions for a couple of the commissions this year. In addition to hearing from some of the most noted authorities involved with the puppetry genre here in Minneapolis, participants in this year's conference will get a special treat as we share a display of the amazing work of In the Heart of the Beast Puppet and Mask Theatre at the entrance to Stage Expo.

It started as a group of activist-artists reflected on a recent trip to Glover, Vermont. They perused pictures they had taken a couple of years earlier on that trip to see the Schumanns' Bread and Puppet Theatre troupe, and they fantasized about a similar idea. They found their first home in the basement of a neighborhood church in 1973, and used it to build and store materials while they performed all over the city. Eventually they began touring.

In 1990 an old movie house, used more recently as a porn palace, was acquired with the help of the city and several neighborhood organizations and became a new home. As the sign on the marquee declared, "Good-bye porn, hello puppets!" a grass roots theatre company declared they were here to stay.

For nearly 30 years now, In the Heart of the Beast Puppet and Mask Theatre has been using water, flour, newspaper, paint, imagination, planning, and playfulness to tell stories that entertain, and explore the joys and sorrows, the struggles and celebrations of human existence in the natural world.

Inspired by the work of Bread and Puppet Theatre ensemble, each year the organization produces a season of original companygenerated plays for both families and adults and, hosts guest puppeteers from around the country and the world. In the Heart of the Beast Puppet and Mask Theatre (HOBT) uses the ancient tradition of puppet and mask theatre to explore issues, events, and values of contemporary society. The forms of puppetry they use are inspired by many cultures from around the world. Their shows emphasize the physical, emotional, and spiritual relationships between the characters. They build "dialogue" with musical and movement narratives in addition to words, translating complex issues of mind and society into images that breathe with soul and spirit.

The theatre, which is internationally recognized for its artistry, is strongly grounded in the concerns of its home neighborhood, and in regional and global issues. The theatre is committed to utilizing its artistry to provide opportunities for hands-on participation in the creation of community-wide puppet and mask events. Community building is done in four distinct ways: through mainstage productions, school residencies, other educational programs, and the annual MayDay Parade and Ceremony.

The MayDay Parade and Ceremony have become the signature event for HOBT. HOBT's MayDay Parade and Festival is eagerly anticipated by approximately 30,000 to 35,000 people who flock to the parade route and ceremony site to join this joyous

MINNESOTA PUPPETS (from page 2) spring ritual. For many, this is the highlight of the year as community members donate countless volunteer hours needed to bring the beautiful and fantastic puppets and floats to life.

Held on the first Sunday in May, MayDay is a testament to community. Immense energy is generated as thousands of people each year work towards a common purpose. There are two parts to the MayDay event — the parade, and the ceremony, followed by a festival in south Minneapolis' Powderhorn Park until dusk. Every year a theme is defined through public workshops, and puppets are created accordingly. With creations ranging from 18 inches to 18 feet in height, HOBT's MayDay celebration is truly a spectacle to behold.

As with the MayDay festival, In the Heart of the Beast provides several opportunities for the community to learn and develop their own puppetry arts. One way this is done is through The Lake Street Theatre Club, a program offered free to youth in the Powderhorn, Phillips, and Central neighborhoods of South Minneapolis (three of the most economically challenged areas in the city) allowing them to create and perform their own puppet shows.

The program was developed in direct response to the lack of opportunities for children in the East Lake Street area. Programs range from three weeks in the summer to eight weeks during the school year. This program builds on the work that HOBT has been doing for many years: conducting artist-in-the-schools residencies that have

helped to bring the transforming power of puppet and mask theater to young people all over the state of Minnesota.

Celebrating its 29th year in 2003, HOBT is recognized as one of the most influential theatre companies in the Twin Cities, for its commitment to the art form of puppetry and for its staying power in a genre that has not always stayed popular. St. Paul Pioneer Press critic Carolyn Petrie said it best - "For more than 25 years, the theater has crafted a reputation built on unwavering activism and a gorgeous artistic vision...This collective of grass-roots artists has spearheaded some of the most breathtaking artistic events in the city's history."

In tribute to HOBT's importance and influence on the theatre scene both regionally and nationally, we are proud to be able to feature a small portion of their its 30-year collection with USITT conference participants.

Puppets will be pulled from previous mainstage productions, and MayDay parades, and will feature some pieces from the recent 25 year retrospective at the Weisman Art Museum on the campus of the University of Minnesota entitled "Theatre of Wonder." In addition, you can check out the puppetry sessions being offered at this year's conference. They will feature artistic personnel from companies all over the Twin Cities, including Sandy Spieler, artistic director of HOTB. Just one more reason to join us this year in Minneapolis 2003-The REAL Great White Way!

Costume Design & Technology Commission Presents Diverse Topics in Minneapolis

The Costume Design & Technology Commission is preparing a diverse slate of sessions for the Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Minnepolis. We have already told you about several sessions: The History of Costume Design at Minneapolis Regional Theatres; Portfolio 101 for Students, Teachers and Professionals; Computer Printing Textiles and Trim; The Advantages of a Boned Bodice Over a Corset; Sharing Your Vintage Collection via the Internet; The Highland Kilt; Fat Pad Chump; A Brief History of the Brief; and Creating Costumes Out of Nothing.

We hope these have sparked your interest and you won't want to miss these other great sessions. BUILDING FOAM COSTUMES SAFELY, presented by Zoe Morsette and Bob Haven, discusses and demonstrates techniques and materials used to create costumes and puppets in foam with emphasis on the safe use and handling of those materials. Samples of pieces seen in the Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade will be used as illustrations. Textile Artist/Costume DESIGNER: AN INTERSECTION OF TALENT discusses the work of Ami Mali Hicks, Fania Mindell and Milla Davenport, noted textile artists and costume designers working in the early twentieth century. The panel will present slides and discuss the ways in which these women applied their talent as textile artists to their costume design work. WOMEN OF SUBSTANCE: COSTUMES FOR SUPER-SIZED LADIES presents information on designing and building costumes for plus-sized female performers with tips for measuring, patterning, and construction.



Natural Surfaces Honored With Golden Pen Award

The 2003 Golden Pen Award will be presented to Judy A. Juracek for Natural Surfaces: Visual Research for Artists, Architects, and Designers, published by W. W. Norton & Company in 2002. This volume is the third in a series, joining Surfaces (Norton, 1996) and Natural Surfaces (Norton, 2000). All three books are filled with beautiful photographs, reproduced in exceptionally high quality color, and provide compact disks as well. The easy-to-use indexing system makes locating images on the disks as easy as turning to a page in the books. All three books contain useful glossaries, extensive bibliographies, and a section of interviews called "Working Papers." Natural Surfaces has interesting interviews with landscape designer Laurie Olin, botanical illustrator Christabel King, and wildlife and exhibition designer John Gywnne.

In nominating Ms. Juracek for the Golden Pen, a USITT member wrote: "If you believe the Chinese proverb that a picture is worth a thousand words, then these three volumes equal a thousand text-based books. In the visual field of design, it is an honor to nominate a rare

and seminal leap forward in both content and presentation — the author and publisher are to be applauded for taking this bold step." Another nomination suggested that "This trilogy of books ...contains materials [that] are all beautifully categorized and available on CD-ROM providing an easy way to download and incorporate selected images into many applications that serves the professional designer and teacher alike." Because theatrical designers and scenic artists alike are always looking for visual tools of communication to convey their ideas and aesthetic thoughts/suggestions to directors, codesigners and crafts-people, Ms. Juracek's books are especially appropriate to receive the Golden Pen Award, because they contain two necessary ingredients: outstanding photography and superb composition of use to costume designers, set designers, properties makers, and scenic artists.

A professional scenic artist and designer, her M.F.A. is from the University of Wisconsin at Madison. Her extensive credits include productions in regional theatre, opera, ballet, and off-Broadway.

While on the faculty at the North Carolina School of the Arts, she cofounded the North Carolina Shakespeare Festival for which she also designed numerous productions. She was scenic artist at the Metropolitan Opera in New York City for productions including *La* Boheme, Don Giovanni, and Salome and for major motion pictures including A Perfect Murder, Two Weeks Notice, You've Got Mail, Unfaithful, and The Money Pit. At work on a fourth volume in the series, focusing on architectural details, Ms. Juracek makes her home in Wilton, Connecticut.

Bobbi Owen, Interim Vice-President for Communications will make the presentation at the Awards Banquet that will culminate the 2003 Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Minneapolis. In addition, Ms. Juracek will be available to sign copies of all three of her books on Friday, March 21, from 2 to 3 p.m. in the USITT Boutique at Stage Expo, and will participate in a session sponsored by the Scene Design Commission on Saturday morning. All three of the Surfaces books will be available for sale at the USITT Boutique.

Take a Day in Minneapolis to Learn About Preserving Our Heritage: Historic Scenic Art

As you decide on possible Professional Development Workshops (PDW) for the upcoming USITT Conference & Stage Expo in Minneapolis, give careful consideration to the one titled PRESERVING OUR HERITAGE. The uniqueness of this PDW is that it can only happen in Minneapolis — a location that offers an unusual mix of opportunity to explore our theatrical past.

The workshop, which will be held on Tuesday, March 18, starts with a trip to the Elmer Andersen Archives — a new state-of-the-art repository for books, architectural blue prints, records of various arts organizations in the Twin Cities, and, of course, the three scenic collections that comprised the "Twin City Scenic" and "Theatre of the Fraternity." Both of these NEH-funded exhibits were featured at USITT Conferences in 1987 and 1998. Participants will be able to see an exhibit comprised of selected items from these vast collections — including original design work from the Guthrie Theater, tour the underground archival — the size of two football fields, and examine first hand the unique sketches from the scenic collections.

The second part of the morning will be devoted to a discussion of the technology behind digitizing the three collections — a portion of the funding for this

project came from the Edward F. Kook Endowment of USITT. Two experts in this specialized field will share their expertise on the technological needs for Preserving Our Heritage. Additional discussions will focus on how these materials came to the university and current research initiated and anticipated from this rich treasure trove. For a more thorough understanding of this monumental task, go to http://digital.lib.umn.edu/scenery/.

The group will then travel to the St. Paul Scottish Rite Temple to see the actu-

al scenery painted in 1908 by the Sosman and Landis Scenic Studio of Chicago. It will be a wonderful opportunity to see how the sketches viewed in the morning translate to full-stage wings and drops. Participants are encouraged to bring cameras as they will be allowed to photograph the rich techniques and past craft of these artisans.

Last stop for the PDW is the Mabel Tainter Theatre in Menomonie, Wisconsin, arguably one of the best and most unique restorations of an 1890 theatre in America. The interior of the auditorium is richly appointed with Moorish detail and stencils. Much of the backstage equipment is still as it was originally installed. 



Utah Shakespearean Festival Welcomes USITT's 2003 Costume Symposium

The Utah Shakespearean Festival is happy to host the 2003 USITT Costume Symposium: *Introduction to Drafting Men's Wear Patterns*. Two three-day sessions will be offered on August 4 to 6 and August 7 to 9.

Workshop participants will be introduced to the principals of drafting systems and practical applications. Participants will have hands-on opportunities to draft a sack coat, frock coat, trousers, and vest using the techniques learned. There will be an opportunity to complete a canvas or muslin mockup of one of the drafts. Workshop instructors will discuss tailoring construction techniques as well as the principles of grading patterns. Each session is limited to 22 participants to assure individualized attention during the intensive three-day period. The second session will be a repeat of the first.

Led by Susan I. Davis and Laurie L. Kurutz, this workshop will appeal to beginning and intermediate costume technicians. It is an essential workshop for those wanting to learn the fundamentals of 19th century pattern drafting for men's wear or those wishing to hone their skills.

Susan I. Davis has been a theatrical costumer for over 17 years. She has cut and tailored for many performing arts companies including Seattle Opera, The Santa Fe Opera, Arena Stage, and The Shakespeare Theatre. With Becky Kaufman, she established and operated Kaufman-Davis Studio, an independent costume studio. Ms. Davis is currently costume shop manager at the Seattle Opera as well as co-owner of Period Corsets, Distinctive Historic Attire.

Laurie L. Kurutz's 23-year professional theatre career began in the costume department at the Oregon Shakespearean Festival, Ashland, where she became a cutter/tailor working with topnotch designers on lavish period productions. In between her 11 seasons in Ashland, she jobbed out to many other outstanding theatres and operas, including Seattle Opera, Berkeley Repertory Theatre, Arizona Theatre Company, Milwaukee Repertory Theatre, Intiman Theatre and

the Perseverance Theatre Company in Alaska.

Registration cost for the Symposium is \$295 for members and \$335 for non-members. Registration includes all instruction and materials, prime tickets for two evening productions at the Festival, a special backstage tour of the facilities, and continental breakfast and lunch each day.

The Shakespearean Festival will celebrate its 42nd season in 2003 with a summer season of six productions. The Festival received the Tony Award for Outstanding Regional Theatre in 2000 and the National Governor's Award for the Arts in 2001. The Festival, located in Cedar City in scenic southern Utah, is 170 miles from Las Vegas and 250 miles from Salt Lake City. The Cedar City airport is served by Skywest Airlines, a Delta Airlines partner. Convenient connections can be made through Salt Lake City. Fifty miles away, St. George airport is also served by Skywest Airlines. All major air carriers serve the Las Vegas airport with many flights each day. A commercial shuttle service can transport travelers from Las Vegas to Cedar City for a modest fee.

Hotel accommodations for the Symposium group are being held at the Town and Country Inn located on Main Street just three blocks from the Festival grounds. Room rates for participants are \$78 for two people with two beds, or \$70 for one or two people with one bed.

ESTA's Draft Standard for Lighting Stands in Public Review

BSR E1.15, Entertainment Technology - Recommended Practices and Guidelines for the Assembly and Use of Theatrical Boom & Base Assemblies, is available for public review and comment through January 28, 2003. Theatrical boom and base assemblies are usually simple things to support a few lighting instruments - a vertical pipe screwed into a heavy base - but they can be a hazard if not assembled and used properly.

This draft standard is intended to help reduce the probability of a boom toppling or a lighting instrument falling from one. Comments on the draft standard are being invited from the public to ensure that the document represents the consensus of the entertainment lighting industry.

This event does not require a major display, a lengthy concept statement, or attendance at the Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Minneapolis. It is designed to be informal and fun. Essentially, we are all interested in seeing and sharing what our colleagues are doing. The Commission recognizes that everyone is pressed for time when it comes to preparing displays and exhibitions. Consequently, we have endeavored to take

the drudgery out of the development and the pressure off the presentation.

Lighting Events Put Spotlight on Prague Quadrennial 2003

The big news this season on the international front is the Prague Quadrennial that will be held June 12 to 29, 2003! This promises to be an especially exciting PQ for lighting designers. OISTAT, the International Organization of Scenographers, Theatre Architects and Technicians, is in the process of establishing a Lighting Working Group, and for the first time, lighting design will be a recognized and substantial element of the PQ. Of the 136 scheduled events at the PQ around two dozen will be for lighting, including open meetings of the International Lighting Working Group and Teachers of Design. Michael Ramsaur has been put in charge of providing a lighting design exhibit, and he has been busy flying around the world in recent months to organize this historic display.

If you haven't been to Prague before, this will certainly be the year to do it. Prague is a stunningly beautiful city with good food, inexpensive accommodations, and a multitude of artists, craftspeople and musicians, not to mention wonderful theatres. It's a walkable city with good public transportation, but you will want to bring a map with you, as the older areas of the city are quite maze-like and not to be missed!

King Lear will be the common focus of a special exhibit of student design work entitled A Lear for Our Times. The variety of perspectives on this play from people of so many different countries will surely be thought-provoking and will spark some lively debates. Structured critiques by renowned international designers will provide students with an extraordinary quality of feedback.

Schools from around the world will be participating in the special lighting and sound exhibit, which will include flat panel displays, video and audio presentations, and real-time lighting and sound designs on the Scenofest Stage. There is still room for more students to get involved, but space is limited, so registration is required. If you are interested, please contact Michael Ramsaur at mram@stanford.edu for more details.

There will be a student design workshop in which three international teams of students, consisting of scenery, costume, lighting and sound designers, will be formed on site to collaborate on a design for *Lear* for a quarter-sized model stage. The teams will be given substantial blocks of time over a several day period to prepare their work, which will be given a formal presentation. This is a truly unique opportunity for students to meet students from other countries, to work together, and to learn from each other's cultural and aesthetic sensibilities.

Another *Lear*-centered design activity will be student presentations of a lighting design and soundscape on a subject or theme from the play. These three- to seven-minute long projects will utilize the moving light rig and music or sound of the students' own choosing. Student designers will prepare the moving light designs in their home countries, and bring them to the PQ for presentation. As of this writing, countries such as Germany, Finland, the US, and Spain are planning to send groups of students to take part in this project, and others have expressed interest but have not yet confirmed their participation. Plans for the rig will be posted on the OISTAT PQ website sometime soon and may be there by the time you are reading this. In addition, renowned scenographers attending the PQ have been asked to participate in a two hour discussion of these designs in what will surely be an exciting exchange of ideas about designing Lear from all over the world.
