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
Robert Brustein to Receive USITT Award in Minneapolis

Robert Brustein, playwright and founding director of the Yale Repertory and American Repertory Theatres, will be honored with the USITT Award at the Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Minneapolis. The USITT Award is given to recognize a lifetime of contributions to the performing arts community. Recent recipients include Jennifer Tipton and Philip Glass.

Mr. Brustein has supervised well over 200 productions, acting in eight and directing 12, including his own adaptations of *The Father*, *Ghosts*, *The Changeling*, and the trilogy of Pirandello works: *Six Characters in Search of an Author*, *Right You Are (If You Think You Are)*, and *Tonight We Improvise*.

He has written 11 adaptations for the A.R.T., most recently *Shlemiel the First, The Wild Duck, The Master Builder*, and *Enrico IV*. He is the author of 12 books on theatre and society, including *Reimagining American Theatre; The Theatre of Revolt; Dumbocracy in America; Making Scenes*, a memoir of his Yale years when he was dean of the Drama School; and *Who Needs Theatre*, a collection of reviews and essays for which he received his second George Jean Nathan Award for dramatic criticism. His penultimate book, *Cultural Calisthenics*, was released in 1998, and his new book, *The Siege of the Arts*, has just been published.

Mr. Brustein is also Professor of English at Harvard University and drama critic for the *New Republic*. Among his numerous awards, Mr. Brustein has received the George Polk Award in journalism, the Elliot Norton Award for professional excellence in Boston theatre, the New England Theatre Conference's 1985 Annual Award

"for outstanding creative achievement in the American theatre," the 1995 American Academy of Arts and Letters Award for Distinguished Service to the Arts, the Pirandello Medal, and a medal from the Egyptian Government for his contribution to world theatre.

ATHE, the Association for Theatre in Higher Education, honored him with a Career Achievement Award in 2000, and the following year he received the Commonwealth Award from the Massachusetts Cultural Council.

Mr. Brustein's adaptation of *Six Characters in Search of an Author* won the Boston Theatre Award for Best Production

of 1996. His play *Demons*, which was broadcast on WGBH radio in 1993, had its stage world premiere as part of A.R.T. New Stages. His play *Nobody Dies on Friday* was given its world premiere in the spring of 1998 in the same series and was presented at the Singapore Festival of Arts that summer. It was published in *New Playwrights: The Best Plays of 1998*, and premiered in Russia in 2000 at the Pushkin Theatre in Moscow.

His short plays *Poker Face*, *Chekhov on Ice*, and *Divestiture* have been presented at the Boston Theatre Marathon. *Chekhov on Ice* also became part of his adaptation of three plays by Anton Chekhov into a piece for the A.R.T. mainstage, *Three Farces and a Funeral*.

Mr. Brustein is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters and the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, as well as an Aspen Institute Fellow. He recently completed a new play called *The Face-Lift*.

The USITT Award will be presented at the Awards Banquet which will conclude the Annual Conference & Stage Expo.

USITT to Honor Ralph Funicello

Former USITT Director at Large and well-respected scenic designer Ralph Funicello will be honored in March when the Institute presents him with the Distinguished Achievement Award in Scene Design for 2003. The award will be given at USITT's Annual Conference & Stage Expo.

Mr. Funicello has designed the scenery for more than 200 plays throughout the United States and Canada. He is an associate artist at the Globe Theatres in San Diego, and has worked extensively with the Mark Taper Forum, the South Coast Rep, the Seattle Rep, and the American Conservatory Theatre, a professional relationship that began in 1972.

The distinguished achievement award will recognize Mr. Funicello, noting that his "tremendous accomplishments in scenic design continue to inspire innovative new directions, foster creative thinking and excellence in design." The award will be presented at a special session DISTINGUISHED SCENE DESIGNER: RALPH FUNICELLO on Friday evening, March 21. He will also be a presenter in MORE RENDERING & TRICKS OF THE TRADE: COMPUTER RENDERING.

His work has been seen on and off-Broadway, at Lincoln Center, the Manhattan Theatre Club, the Milwaukee Rep, the American Festival Theatre, the Arizona Theatre Company, the Berkeley Rep, the Denver Center Theatre Company, the Pacific Conservatory of the Performing Arts, the Williamstown Theatre Festival, the Intiman Theatre, The Huntington Theatre, A Contemporary Theatre, the Guthrie Theater, the Oregon Shakespeare Festival, the Stratford Festival in Ontario, New York City Opera, and Houston Grand Opera.

Mr. Funicello's work has been exhibited at the New York Public Library for the Performing Arts, the University of San Diego, San Diego State University, Tiffany & Co. San Diego, the Chevron Gallery in San Francisco, The Prague Quadrennial, The Milwaukee Art Museum, The Dorothy Chandler Pavilion in Los Angeles, and the Exhibition of Stage Design in Beijing.

He received a Michael Merritt Award for Excellence in Design and Collaboration. His designs have been recognized by the Bay Area Theatre Critics' Circle, the L.A. Drama Critics' Circle, *Dramalogue* magazine, and *Backstage West*.

Mr. Funicello has served on the theatre panel of the National Endowment for the Arts. He was a USITT Director at Large from 1996 to 2001, and the United States representative to the Scenography Commission of the International Organization of Scenographers, Theatre Architects and Technicians (OISTAT) from 1994 to 2001. He currently holds the Powell Chair in Set Design at San Diego State University.

Soon, the 2003 Annual Conference & Stage Expo will open in Minneapolis. On behalf of all the Commissions, I welcome you to the many splendid sessions that are being offered. Rather than repeat them here, I urge you to go to www.usitt.org to see the entire list. Although each Commission offers anywhere from seven to 17 programs, be sure that you don't focus just on your own areas of specialization. Make an effort to take advantage of the many events that cross over Commissions.

While at the conference, plan to attend several important meetings, i.e. your Commission meeting(s) and your Regional Section meeting. Commissions are preparing programs that will be able to travel (Costume Design & Technology already has six and Engineering has one), making

it possible to share conference programming with section members who were not able to attend the conference, as well as section members who were busy doing other things. Ask more about these traveling sessions in your commission meetings.

At Commission meetings, come prepared with ideas and resources for future programming. During the Minneapolis conference, we will be developing programs for both the 2004 conference in Long Beach and 2005 event in Toronto. Conference Program Proposal forms are available on the web site by going to the Commissions link (top of page). If possible, complete the forms before coming to the conference and give them to the appropriate commissioner(s) prior to the initial Commission meeting. This will allow for a thorough discussion of the proposal to determine its possible interest to other Commission members.

Programming is an important commission activity, but don't forget about project work. Bring your ideas for projects, too. Some funding is available to assist in developing projects. It may not fund the entire project, but it will get you started. Most Commissions have several ongoing projects, so even if you don't have an idea of your own, consider participating in an existing effort.

Commissioners can be contacted via the bulletin board in the Conference office in Minneapolis, by looking for ribbons indicating what office different people hold, or by stopping at the USITT booth at Stage Expo, near the USITT Boutique. There you will find commission information as well as people able to talk about Commission activities.

I extend our welcome to you all, and an invitation to become active commission members now or in the near future.



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

Dan Dugan to Receive Sound Design Award

An artist and innovator in the field of sound design will be recognized when USITT presents the Harold Burris-Meyer Distinguished Career in Sound Design Award to Dan Dugan. The award will be presented as part of the Annual Conference & Stage Expo held March 19 to 22 in Minneapolis, Minnesota.

Mr. Dugan says he has always been fascinated by combinations of art and technology. When he was taken to the theatre as a child, he says he always wanted to go backstage to see the light board. In his teens he built a huge model circus and two small pipe organs. He has been active in music, singing bass in his church choir, the San Diego Bach Chorus, and in madrigal groups performing on the green at the Shakespeare Festival. In college he dropped out of a four-year scholarship to work full-time in the theatre doing lighting, which became his first career. He did lighting designs for the San Diego National Shakespeare Festival, the San Diego Opera, and the San Francisco Actors' Workshop.

In his mid-20s, Mr. Dugan switched to theatre sound, working for the San Diego National Shakespeare Festival and the American Conservatory Theatre in San Francisco. In 1968 A.C.T. created the title "Sound Designer" to describe what Dan Dugan was doing. He provided sound services for many seasons of the Mondavi

Jazz Festival and engineered several independent record albums, including Kate Wolf's first two albums which are still available, now as CDs.

Mr. Dugan is known in audio engineering as the inventor of the automatic microphone mixer. His patented equipment is used in thousands of churches, courtrooms including the U.S. Supreme Court, and on television shows including David Letterman and Hollywood Squares.

He manufactures his invention in the form of the Model D-2 Automatic Mixing Controller, a complete redesign of his famous Model D series using digital signal processing. His service department specializes in the Swiss Nagra tape recorders used for location recording. In his digital audio studio, he produces custom CDs for dance performance: ballet, modern, ethnic dance, and ice skating.

Mr. Dugan notes that in addition to engineering, he has a lively interest in philosophy, particularly skepticism, the philosophy of science, and current controversies about scientific paradigms and alternative medicine.

The Harold Burris-Meyer Distinguished Career in Sound Design Award recognizes "a lifetime spent establishing the field of sound design for the performing arts, as both an artist and innovator in audio engineering and technology." The award will be presented as part of the Annual Awards Banquet on Saturday, March 22 and at the Sound Commission's Sound Awards & Playback Party on Thursday evening, March 20.

ESTA Seeks Comment On Hoist Systems

BSR E1.6, Entertainment Technology — Powered Hoisting Systems for Places of Public Assembly, is available for public review until March 11, 2003. This draft American National Standard establishes safety requirements for the design, manufacture, installation, and use of motorized rigging systems in theaters, theme parks, studios, and other places of public assembly and performance. This document does not address manually powered systems or lifting equipment used in the construction of these spaces.

Light Lab Sessions, Peter Kaczorowski Bring Variety to Minneapolis

By the time you read this, the Minneapolis Annual Conference & Stage Expo will be only a few weeks away, and members of the Lighting Commission are busy finalizing exceptional sessions for this year's conference. The 2003 offerings will be informative, thought provoking, and entertaining. Sessions are geared toward the seasoned professional, the educator, and those just beginning to explore the exciting possibilities of our art form.

After a two-year hiatus, the light lab will be back and in full operation at this year's conference. Sessions planned for the lab include LIGHTING MULTI-ETHNIC CASTS, GROUND TRUSS LIGHTING, FOLLOW SPOT CUEING AND OPERATION, and LIGHTING DESIGNER/STAGE MANAGER COLLABORATION IN DANCE. All of these sessions will be insightful and beneficial to

For students, the commission has several sessions geared primarily toward the beginning designer. These sessions include RENDERING FOR LIGHTING DESIGNERS, a hands-on session in story boarding; STUDENTS MEET ESTA, an opportunity for students to meet and converse with manufacturers and distributors plus professional designers and technicians; and I'M STILL IN SCHOOL, WHAT SHOULD I BE TAKING?, in which a panel of designers will discuss what students should know before leaving school. This session is co-sponsored by the Gilbert Hemsley Internship Program.

On hand for the Gilbert Hemlsey session will be Peter Kaczorowski, a lighting designer who has worked consistently on and off Broadway for the past 20 years. His extensive honors include the 2001 Tony Award for The Producers. He has designed extensively for leading resident theatres such as Lincoln Center, the Roundabout, the New York Shakespeare Festival, Playwright's Horizons, and City Center's Encores. His regional theatre credits include productions for the Guthrie, La Jolla Playhouse, Seattle Rep, Berkeley Rep, and South Coast Rep among many others. Opera credits include San Francisco Opera, Houston Grand Opera, Los Angeles Music Center Opera, New York City Opera, Santa Fe, and Seattle Opera. Abroad, he has lit productions in London's West End and has created opera designs for The Royal Opera Covent Garden, Scottish Opera, Opera/North, the Bonn State Opera, the Edinburgh Festival, and the Nissei Theatre in Tokyo.

As mentioned in earlier issues of Sightlines, USITT is fortunate to have Allen Lee Hughes as distinguished lighting designer. Mr. Hughes' career has spanned several decades and he has gleaned many awards for his work. The Lighting Commission is honored to celebrate his work as a lighting designer and is looking forward to hearing him recount his career in the theatre.

Mr. Hughes will also participate in a session, MASTER CLASS ON USING GOBOS IN MODERN STAGE LIGHTING, co-sponsored by the lighting Commission and Rosco Laboratories, Inc. In this session, Mr. Hughes will describe how and why he selects gobos and color for a production, and what effect the choices have on the overall mood of the play.

Other sessions of interest include NON-THEATRICAL THEATRICAL LIGHTING CAREERS in which a panel of trained lighting designers discuss their jobs outside theatre; DESIGNING IN NON-TRADITIONAL SPACES, a session on the pitfalls and successes of designing lighting in spaces not meant for theatrical productions; Where Are Computers Taking Us, a session about the future of computers in lighting design and implementation; CAPTURING THE LIGHT — DIGITAL VS. ANALOGUE IMAGES, a session dealing with the advantages and disadvantages of both types of cameras, and how to improve your work with either; and finally for the brave-hearted, A TOUR OF MINNEAPOLIS ARCHITECTURAL LIGHTING in which a Minneapolis based architect will lead the group through the downtown area describing how the spectacular lighting effects are achieved.

A limited number of spots are still available for the two Professional Development Workshops which will be held before the Annual Conference & Stage Expo begins. AN INTRODUCTION TO ARCHITECTURAL LIGHTING will have professionals from Schuler & Shook discussing how to make the transition from lighting for the theatre to lighting architecture. Also included in the day-long session will be a breakdown of the design process including time, budget, and collaboration. Also covered will be photometics and architectural lighting fixtures. COLLABORATING FOR DANCE - STAGE MANAGERS AND LIGHTING DESIGNERS, will have two master classes, one on "how to" and the other on touring for dance. In addition, teams guided by industry professionals will work with dancers from the University of Minnesota to develop a design approach, go through tech, and then stage a performance. Both participant and observer slots are available for the session. Complete descriptions of the PDWs and registration information can be found on page 9.

So, it should be obvious that this year's conference should be exciting and worth the price of admission. Pack your mukluks, hitch your reindeer to the sleigh, and head on up to The REAL Great White Way. We look forward to seeing you in Minneapolis.

Three Authors To Receive TD& T Writing Awards

The Herbert D. Greggs Award and the Herbert D. Greggs Merit Awards are given to promote innovative, in-depth writing about theatre design and technology. This year, three authors are being recognized for their outstanding articles published in $TD \phi T$.

Joe Brandesky, author of "Spectacular St. Petersburg: 100 Years of Russian Theatre Design," will receive the Herbert D. Greggs Award. Delbert Unruh and Thomas Blalock will receive Herbert D. Greggs Merit Awards for their respective articles, "Shattered Mirror: A Theatre in Search of Itself, Parts I through IV" and "Stage Lighting in an Early-Twentieth-Century Theatre."

Nominations for the Greggs Awards are selected each year by a panel consisting of members of the Publications Committee and the editors of $TD\phi T$. They review all the articles in the previous four issues of $TD \phi T$ and vote for their first, second, and third choices. The article which receives the most first-place points is nominated for the Herbert D. Greggs Award, and the other two are nominated for the Herbert D. Greggs Merit Awards.

For many of the judges, this opportunity to review and compare over 25 feature articles is both rewarding and frustrating. It's rewarding, some have said exhilarating, to feast on the ideas and images that have accumulated in a year's worth of $TD \dot{\varphi} T$ issues. It's also frustrating to pick out only three as deserving these awards. With the enormous variety of ideas presented in $TD\phi T$ it can seem unfair to compare, for instance, an exceptional technical article with an exceptional design article, and decide which one is better.

This year the judges rated 13 of 25 eligible articles as being their choices for first, second, or third. The three authors selected out of this tough competition really deserve their accolades.

Below are some of the comments made by the judges upon submitting their choices.

• "Spectacular St. Petersburg: 100 Years of Russian Theatre Design" by Joe Brandesky, published in the spring 2002

"This article makes available to us a

rich treasure of theatrical design." "This is a substantive, comprehensive and coherent survey of an extremely important theatre culture." "Lavishly illustrated, stylish renderings, and cleverly organized into 'five act' sections, this article covers Russian cultural and artistic upheavals as represented in the theatrical activity of St. Petersburg. The author cites his sources, including Russian language documents, and he does an outstanding job of covering the period from the Bolsheviks to the end of the Soviet era."

• "The Shattered Mirror: A Theatre in Search of Itself" by Delbert Unruh, published in four parts in the winter 2001, spring 2001, fall 2001 and winter 2002 issues:

"Professor Unruh has repeatedly informed us of the trends and context of Eastern European theatre design. These articles continue on that long tradition but now the author is challenging us to reexamine these aesthetics in relationship to the context of changes within the political climate in the former Eastern European

block countries. It has been a delight to see the world of design through his eyes." "Once again Unruh's excellent writing elucidates the trends in one of the leading countries in the development of modern scenography. This is material not available anywhere else."

• "Stage Lighting in an Early-Twentieth-Century Theatre" by Thomas J. Blalock, published in the winter 2002 issue:

"A charming study of the historic 1903 Colonial Theatre in Pittsfield, Massachusetts. The value of this article goes beyond the theatre itself, providing a connecting thread and historical perspective for lighting designers and theatre architects of today." "A fine evocation of the technical infrastructure of a theatre of a bygone yet familiar era. The writing is plain, in the best sense, and the illustrations effectively reinforce the text."
