# Draft of Revised DMX512 Available for a Third Public Review

ESTA/USITT DMX512 Revision Task Group Chair USITT Engineering Vice-Commissioner

USITT and ESTA announce the availability of a revised and updated version of USITT DMX512/1990 for a second Public Review. USITT and ESTA urge interested parties to offer constructive comments, both positive and negative. Comments on BSR E1.11 are being sought so that the revised standard may reflect the consensus of the entertainment lighting industry.

The comment period is now open, and will end at 5:00 p.m. ET, September 30, 2003. Comments received after this time may not be considered as part of this public review.

This revision was developed under the

auspices of the ESTA Technical Standards Program, and is known as BSR E1.11, Entertainment Technology - USITT DMX512-A, Asynchronous Serial Digital Data Transmission Standard for Controlling Lighting Equipment and Accessories. The document along with complete instructions for commenting may be downloaded from ESTA's web site (www.esta.org – click on *Technical Standards Program* and follow the links), or request a hard copy from ESTA's technical standards manager.

When commenting, please provide the following:

- clear identification of the relevant clause and page;
- the proposed change marked in legislative format, with strike-throughs to indicate deleted text (<del>deleted wording</del>)

# Costume Design & Technology Commission Calls for Symposium Proposals

One of the core missions of the Costume Design & Technology Commission is to sponsor an annual symposium.

Programming is created for working professionals in commercial, regional, and educational costuming. The content and thrust is the prerogative of the symposium coordinator. Typically there are two types of symposia: the mini-conference approach in which a variety of sessions are offered featuring the resources of a particular area; or a master class which offers hands-on opportunities to develop specific skills or techniques.

This year, the symposium was held in Cedar City, Utah. It was hosted by the Utah Shakespearean Festival and organized by Jeffrey Lieder. The symposium followed the master class model and focused on men's tailoring. In addition to three days of intense classes taught by Susan Davis and Laurie Kurutz, the participants also saw productions by the Utah Shakespearean Festival and explored some of the beautiful state and national parks.

The previous year, the symposium was held in Cincinnati, and Kathy Brookfield, Dean Mogle, and Rebecca Senske organized a wide range of sessions. They featured local artists and crafts people, a trip to the Cincinnati Art Museum, and costumes from the Broadway productions *Cyrano! The Musical* and *The Scarlet Pimpernel*. Many sessions also focused on costume storage solutions.

The ideas for symposia come from our members. Working with the costume commissioner and the USITT office, the symposium coordinator is responsible for the programming, the speakers or instructors, the facility, transportation, food, and all of the other details that make a successful symposium. The process takes about one year from formal proposal to the realized symposium. Serving as a symposium coordinator takes a great deal of hard work and dedication, but it can be very rewarding.

Currently there are no formal proposals for 2004. A formal proposal includes a detailed budget and schedule of events. The Costume Design & Technology Commission hopes to have at least two to three symposia ideas or formal proposals identified. If you have an idea for a symposium or would like to serve as a symposium coordinator, there are guidelines and support available to help you through the process. Millinery methods using paper products, as well as crafting head coverings from non-traditional materials and found objects will be included in the presentation. Techniques to make new hats from old, easy to sew Renaissance hats, along with "secrets of the coif," will have participants convinced that anything can be a hat!

Educators will be especially interested in Bunraku Puppetry: A Venerable Style Applied to New Curriculum, moderated by Shan Ayers, with guest puppeteers Taro Maeda and Hidehiko Abe of Biwasho, Japan. Using Bunraku as an example of non-western theatre technique, panel members investigate the integration of these techniques into pedagogy and curriculum. The Prague Quadrennial is the world's premiere exhibition of theatrical design, produced every four years since 1967. **Trends in World Stage Design: A Visual Report on the Prague Quadrennial 2003** will be a comprehensive visual report on the National exhibitions and the award winners at PQ'03 presented by Eric Fielding, who has been documenting and reporting on the Prague Quadrennials since 1976, plus brief reports by USITT members of their own visual images and experiences at the 2003 PQ.

Michael Ramsaur, organizer of the Student Scenofest at the Prague Quadrennial, and students who attended PQ describe their experiences and present a video made by United States students giving their viewpoint of the National exhibit, the US Student exhibit, and other interesting international exhibits. Learn about the OISTAT Scenofest of lectures, workshops, design critiques, and informal student meetings. Students who attended will also give their personal views of PQ.

Ian Dusek focuses on three productions (Long Day's Journey Into Night, The Master and Margarita, and Othello) to present the principles of action design as developed in the Czech Republic. Action design began in the 1970s and was originally called "poor theatre." It is based on the development of the dramatic space according to the performance on stage and requires the audience's individual interpretation. It has no telling value on its own – rather, the design makes sense only in the context of the individual actors, cre-



# Tony Award-Winning South Coast Repertory: a tour, a play...and more!

On Tuesday, March 16, a short 20-minute bus ride will deliver you to what Time Magazine has recently named one of "the five best theatres in the country," South Coast Repertory (SCR). Located in Orange County, this Tony Award-winning company has mounted over 385 productions since it was established in 1964. SCR has won national and local rave reviews and has become a home for new playwrights. Earning a well-deserved reputation among the theatre community for its excellence in theatrical design and production, SCR attracts the best directors, actors, and designers. Most recently SCR spent \$19 million to renovate and expand its facilities.

Jon Lagerquist, technical director of SCR since 1985, will host a comprehensive tour backstage and onstage of the renovation and expansion project. The fabulous Folino Theatre Center, designed by Cesar Pelli, doubled the size of the South Coast Repertory facility from 40,000 to 80,000 square feet and added a third theatre to the complex. The complex also houses the technical shops, administrative offices, dressing rooms, rehearsal spaces, and education center. New stage and architectural lighting and sound equipment and systems are integrated into the old systems. An incredibly dramatic facade includes a 300-foot wall of glass wrapping around the theatre's lobby. According to Mr. Lagerquist, it is "gorgeous." During this tour, he will share the exciting new changes and the "challenges" created by the new theatre and the expansion.

Following the tour, there will be free time to explore the area and have dinner. Across the street from SCR is the magnificent Orange County Performing Arts Center. Inside is the 3,000-seat multi-use Segerstrom Hall, which houses opera, ballet, theatre, and symphonic performances.

A five-minute walk west through a park and over a bridge is the world-famous South Coast Plaza. This is truly a mall for everyone and every budget. Stores include Tiffany, Dior, Fendi, Lalique, Armani, Versace, Godiva Chocolates, Ann Taylor, Ralph Lauren, Coach, Nordstrom's, Macy's, Saks Fifth Avenue, The Gap, Borders, Crate & Barrel, and many, many others. There are a number of trade shows for the performing arts industry, but USITT Stage Expo stands out in the crowd because of the sheer variety of companies and organizations that exhibit.



In the past eight years, more than \$44,000 in awards have been given as USITT seeks out and recognizes young professionals at the start of their careers.

Since 1995, Awards for Young Designers & Technicians in the Performing Arts have been presented as a key part of the Institute's mission to "recognize excellence and significant contributions in the performing arts and entertainment industry." Institute supporters have a strong commitment to including rising talent in that recognition.

Nominations are now being accepted for the 2004 awards, which will again be presented as a part of the Annual Conference & Stage Expo in Long Beach, California. Nomination information and forms are available from www.usitt.org. USITT members must nominate student members to have them considered for the special recognition and cash prizes.

KM Fabrics, Inc., manufacturers of woven cotton and inherently flame retardant velours, established the first Award for Young Designers and Technicians in the Performing Arts in 1995, with a major contribution to make the award possible. Richard Heusel, Founder and CEO of KM, noted that he and his company always want to give something back to the community – in this case the business community.

The KM Fabrics, Inc. Technical Production Award was first presented in 1995. At the 2003 Annual Conference & Stage Expo, two awards were presented doubling KM's support of the program.


In 1996, the Clear-Com Intercom Systems Sound Achievement Award was given for the first time. Three new awards were added in 1998: the Barbizon Award for Lighting Design; the Rose Brand Award for Scene Design; and the Zelma H. Weisfeld Costume Design & Technology Award.

"We are more than fortunate that individuals and companies have stepped forward to create and support these awards. This has allowed us to expand the program and recognize young talent," said Elynmarie Kazle, USITT Vice-President for Membership & Development.

Additional awards were created in 1999 when Kryolan began its support of the Kryolan Makeup Design Award and Bernhard Works established the Frederick A. Buerki Golden Hammer Scenic Technology Award in honor of his mentor at the University of Illinois. In 2001, a unique Stage Management Award was created. Each year the award is giving in honor of a seasoned stage manager, who is usually on hand to participate in the conference.

The newest Award for Young Designers & Technicians in the Performing Arts is given specifically to an undergraduate student – the W. Oren Parker Award for Scene Design, created by Charles Williams.

Ms. Kazle emphasized that the supporters of the awards have assured a strong future for the program by their ongoing participation.

The survey has 154 entries and is 85 percent accurate from 2002. Only 23 schools have information in the survey older than two years. The largest number of participants reporting is in the Great Lakes Region with 28 listings. The smallest is the Rocky Mountain Region with five. The Southeast Region has the highest number of current revisions.

This year we will add an international section with the University of Switzerland.

#### Free Download Available ANSI Approves Fog Standard

ANSI's Board of Standards Review has approved ANSI E1.5-2003, Entertainment Technology - Theatrical Fog made with Aqueous Solutions of Di- and Trihydric Alcohols. This standard is now referenced in ESTA's "A Test Is Worth a Thousand Words" fog testing program and is available for free download from the ESTA website.

The new standard specifies the components of glycol and glycerin fog and the ceiling and the time-weighted-average exposure limits for the fogs. The ceiling limits are rationally based on scientific data and are consistent with the ceiling limits that have been specified in many performer union contracts, but the standard goes beyond those contractual limits by also controlling the time-weighted-average levels. The standard specifies the glycols that can be used in a conforming fog to proscribe irritating, common industrial glycols and ensure that only those glycols for which there is ample, public documentation of their benignity are used.

The ANSI E1.5 standard is available at www.esta.org/tsp/E1-5\_2003.pdf. More information about ESTA's "A Test Is Worth a Thousand Words" fog testing program is available at http://www.esta.org/foginfo/index.html.

ANSI E1.5 was drafted by the Fog & Smoke Working Group, part of the ANSIaccredited standards committee E1, Safety and Compatibility of Entertainment Technical Equipment and Practices. The Entertainment Services and Technology Association is the secretariat for Accredited Standards Committee E1 and provides administrative support to the committee. Membership in the working group is open to all who are affected by its work. Membership in ESTA is not a requirement.
